

Killed With An Axe.

THE CRIMINAL TRIES TO CUT HIS THROAT. PENITENTIARIES, May 17.—Late last evening the news reached Penitentiaries that a farmer named Daniel Dewal, living about nine miles from here in the township of Tinty, had died during the afternoon from the effects of a blow from an axe, given by another farmer named Henry Yorke. Various stories were floated through the town to-day respecting the quarrel between the two men and the subsequent death of Dewal, and in the afternoon an inquest was held.

The accused man Yorke made an attempt at suicide twice during the forenoon, once by attempting to cut his throat, and failing in this, he shortly afterwards ascended to the roof of the house and threw himself down, receiving injuries of a very serious nature. The particulars of the quarrel are as follows:—Daniel Dewal was a tenant of Yorke and lived less than one fourth of a mile distant. He and Yorke had a dispute about part of the land which Dewal had rented from Yorke which had been newly chopped. Yorke wished to use the land himself, and went there Wednesday with an axe to work clearing the land up. Dewal seeing him there, ordered him to leave, which Yorke refused to do. They sat down on a log beside each other to talk the matter over, when Dewal, turning his face away for a moment, and looking around again saw Yorke strike him with an axe. He attempted to ward off the blow, but it came down on his forehead, felling him senseless to the earth. On recovering consciousness he found Yorke standing over him with a revolver and threatening to finish his fending work by blowing his brains out. In a stupor the unfortunate victim staggered to his home and informed his wife of what had occurred, the gash on his forehead bearing fearful testimony to the truth of his statement, and the design of his assailant. Information was lodged with a J. P. named Brock, but he being ill and unable to attend to the case, the parties met and came to an agreement, by which Dewal for a paltry \$20 bargained not to prosecute the criminal for the crime which in a few days was to hurry him to his grave. Thus the affair stood until Sunday, when Dewal appearing to be losing his faculties by stupor, medical assistance was called in but it was of no avail. On Monday there were symptoms of pneumonia in addition, and on Tuesday he died. Before dying he made a deposition setting forth the particulars of the quarrel, which corresponded with the above version.

The scene of the affair is a quiet farming district in what would be called the new country, and the people have been in a great state of excitement since hearing of the unhappy death. Although the man is the busiest season for the farmers, they could be seen in knots of twos and threes discussing the all engrossing subject, and speculation was freely indulged in as to what the result of the inquest would be. The accused man seems to have friends, and sympathizers among his neighbors. His poor wife is worrying herself to death over the affair, and doubtless in a few days her grey hair will be bronzed down to the roots, on account of the evil charge brought home to her husband. On visiting the house of the deceased, his widow and six little ones were found bemoaning the loss of him who had been their only provider, one poor little brat about three years old asking almost incessantly "Where is Pa?" and the sad-hearted mother had no words of answer. The poor little one was at length consoled and fell asleep, while the rest of the children stood around in hushed expectancy.

About four o'clock in the afternoon the Coroner's jury were got together and the inquest began. The evidence brought out at the inquest brought the guilt home to Yorke. The medical evidence as to the cause of death, the deposition of the dead man, the confession of Yorke himself made previous to his victim's death, were all strongly condemnatory. After hearing the evidence of the witnesses the jury brought in a verdict that Daniel Dewal had come to his death by blow from an axe by the hands of Henry Yorke, and that Yorke was guilty of manslaughter. After this verdict was received a coroner was made out for the arrest of Yorke, but owing to his illness it is not likely he will be removed to the county jail at Barrie for a few days, if indeed death does not ensue from the injuries he is figured on himself this attempting suicide. If he recovers sufficiently he will be sent to await his trial at the next Assize.
