The Grit Candidate in West York.

Mr. Thomas Hodgins, Q. C., is carrying the much bedragged banner of the Grit party, in this Riding. It will be well to enquire who this individual is, who is ambitious of representing West York in the House of Commons.

Mr. Hodgins was a prominent member of the Black-bottle Brigade, who included in its ranks, such illustrious embryo Grit statesmen as J. D. Edgar, R. W. Wells and David Blaine, the latter of whom misrepresented us for a time at Ottawa.

In the session of 1878, a feeling of holy joy pervaded the assembly for West York, when the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie, who had been elected to the House of Commons, and who had just returned from Ottawa, addressed the House.

Mr. Wallace went into the tariff question very minutely, and proved all his assertions by figures. He clearly showed that the country had benefited by the National Policy, and that the interests of the people were being sacrificed to the interests of a few capitalists.
