A reconnaissance was made from Alexandria in strength for the purpose of determining Arabi's exact position and strength. The troops behaved with a coolness and courage that would have delighted the heart of Wellington The action, which was gallantly and successfully fought, brought forth numerous deeds of bravery which redound to the credit of the British Army. The latest despaches from Censtantinople piesent a very hot eful aspect of affairs at the Conference. At Tuesday's sitting the Turkish representatives amounced the Porte's acceptance of the conditions of the identical note regarding Turkish intervention, and the formation of an international police for the protection of the Sues Canal. He also informed Lord Dufferin that in accordance with his demand Arabi would be proclaimed a rebel. This concilatory sction on the part of the Sultan was probably hastened by the announcement that Russian troops had been ordered to prepare to embark for Constantinople immediately on war breaking out between England and Turkey. Two Turkish Commissioners sail immediately for Alexandra, and it is hoped that Arabi's troops will submit to Dervish Pasha on his arrival. At Alexandra matters remain very quiet pending Sir Garnet Wolssely's arrival. Her Majesty has personally made enquiries after the sick and wounded soldiers. Arabi has brought up troops from Kafr-el-Dwar to repair and strengthen his entrenchments. He still appears to hope for success, and is keeping up communication with the Porte. One of his couriers has been intercepted and his despatches taken from him.
