FURTY DAYS OF SNOW.

Remarkable Cold Winters In The Past

Fourteen Centuries. The following statistics of the good old winters are curious: In 401, the Black Sea was entirely frozen over. In 763, not only the Black Sea, but the Straits of the Dardai were frozen over; the snow in some places rose fitty feet high. In 822, the great rivers of Europe the Danube, the Eibe, etc, -were so nard frozen as to bear heavy wagons for a month. In 860, the Adriatic was frozen. In 991, everything was frozen: the crops totally tailed, and famine and pestilence closed the year. In 1067, the most of the travelors in dermany were frozen to death on the roads. In 1133, the Po was frezen from Cremons to he sea: the wine casks were burst, and even the trees split by the action of the frost with

mmense noise.
In 1236, the Danube was frozen to the bottom, and remained long in that state. In 1316, the crops wholly failed in Germany; wheat, which some years before sold in Eng land at 6s, the quarter, rose to £2. In 1339, the crops failed in Scotland, and such a famine ensued that that poor were reduced to feed n grass, and many perished miserably fields. The successive winters of 1432-33 34 were uncommonly severe. It once snowed forty days without interruption. In 1468, the
