The Way It Is Done!

For the enlightenment of our contemporary of Newmarket, (of course we mean the Era,) it is as well to explain that the tabular statement of taxes levied in this village for the past ten years, published by us in our issue of the 2nd inst., does not give the whole amount levied annually in this School Section for Public School purposes, and theretor the Era and "ratepayers in other parts of the County" are unnecessarily "suspicious that the connection of the High School with the Public School of that village, (meaning Richmond Hill.) has contributed to cheapen education in that municipality at the expense of other parts of the County." The facts are this is a Union School Section,-assessed in three parts as follows :---

Richmond Hill Village assessment 1882 \$160,755 Markham part of School Section " " 98,906 Vauxham grant (4750 98,90**5** 64,750 aughan grant....

Total... \$ 324,810 The amount required by the Board of School Trustees for Public School purposes, for the year 1882, is \$1050, which sum is levied on the three parts of the Union Section in the following proportions :---

Richmond Hill Village part of School Sec. \$612,50 Markham part of Yaughan '' '' 264,30 " 264.30 " 173.20

Total. \$1050.00 Of the village portion of the Public School tax we have on hand from last year \$23.22, which reduces the amount to \$589.28, and this sum is further reduced by the Village Council appropriat-

ing the sum of \$108.75 of interest arising from surplus funds belonging to the village,-received from the Provincial Government, known as the "Surplus distribution fund"-leaving the sum of \$480.53 together with five per cent. added for cost of collection, -- amounting to \$504.55.

From year to year, this has been the course pursued by the Village Council in regard to the sums required for Public School purposes,—some years the amount required has been more or less, as the necessities of the School board demanded,-and in former years, the the annual income, arising from interest on the village surplus funds, was more than it has been this year, - therefore the amount to raise by direct tax would be less than now.

The accounts for the High School and Public School are kept separate,--the accounts are not mixed in any way, and it is impossible to appropriate any portion of the funds belonging to one department for the purpose of applying it to the other.
