NORWAY, Mich, April 11,-At Keeleridge Mine, Menomenee Range, Michigan iron district, yesterday, 90 feet of ground between the main engine house and No 1 shaft caved in. The engine house in which there were nine men and all the mine machinery and four large boilers, went down one to two thousand feet.
