A Good Idea.

Some of the members of our School Board are of the opinion that a meeting of all the school sections, or at least representatives of each might very reasonably be held in some central locality in North York, for the purpose of discussing the merits of the new school Readers. which are about to take the place of the old series. We should like to see the plan adopted, if at all practicable.

It appears to us, so far as we can see, that there is a desire on the part of certain publishers to force their new school Readers on the towns and villages, with out taking into account whether law is respected or not. By this means they hope to draw in the rural sections to fol low in the wake of incorporated towns and villages by adopting the same book. Every school teacher, with the consent of the Board of Trustees in any school section, has a perfect right to adopt which of the series he thinks proper, independently of any other school's adop-
