

Markham Township Council.

The above Council met at Smith's Hall, Unionville, on Sunday, 17th inst. The members all present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Mr. James, seconded by Mr. Lundy, moved that the Treasurer pay John Brumwell \$6 75 for labor in repairing hill and culvert near east branch of the Don on the Townline between this municipality and York, which is to pay a like amount.

Mr. Lundy, seconded by Mr. Forster moved that the Treasurer pay John Dennison \$1, being for services rendered this municipality in searching for gravel on Lot 27, Con. 2, said amount payable on order of the mover.

Mr. James, seconded by Forster, moved that the Treas. pay John Klink \$6 00, for lumber and repairing bridge in front of Lot 32, 2nd Con.

Forster, seconded by James, moved that the Treas. pay Gideon Baker \$2 25, being half amount for gravel furnished this municipality on north townline, at 7 cents per yd., payable on order of the Reeve.

Mr. James, seconded by Reesor, moved that the Treas. pay N. K. Harrington \$21 30, for building breakwater and removing gravel between Lots 25 and 26 in 7th Con., said sum payable on order of the Reeve.

Mr. James, seconded by Reesor, moved that the Treas. pay D. Dore \$3, for burial of stranger found dead in lot 10n, Markham, as certified by Dr. Hillary, coroner for county of York.

Lundy, seconded by James, moved that the Treas. pay the following accounts for gravel, as certified by various overseers, viz: J. Horsley, 27 yds., at 10 cts. per yd., Jos. Lunau, overseer, div. 27, \$2 70, J. Horsley, 26 yds., at 10 cts. per yd., Jas. Bell overseer, div. 34, \$2 60; J. Horsley, 45 yds., at 10 cts. per yd., W. Padgett, overseer, div. 29, \$4 50; F. Storey, 21 1/2 yds., at 10 cts. per yd., north townline, \$2 15, W. Padgett, 12 yds., at 10 cts. per yd., Wm Padgett, overseer, div. 29, \$1 20, also \$2 for damages to pasture and labor collecting lumber in hauling gravel in 1883.

Forster, seconded by James, moved that the Treas. pay the following accounts for material, &c., furnished this municipality, as certified by the various overseers, viz: D. Quantz, div. 13, for plank at \$12 per M, \$3 64; Wm Radcliff, plank at \$11 per M, \$88 76; Hugh Clark, plank at \$13 per M, \$38 52; Baker & Jamieson, plank at \$13 per M, half for north townline, payable on order of the Reeve, \$4 84; Speight Mfg. Co. div. 52, plank at \$13 per M, \$4 26; Albert E. Cross, plank at \$10 per M, \$3 42; T. & G. Morgan, div. 52, steel & copper, \$9.

James, seconded by Forster, moved that the Reeve be hereby authorized to execute the agreement in duplicate between this municipality and the Ontario & Quebec R. R. Company for laying water-pipes on the sidewalk between Lots 10 and 11, 10th Con.

Reesor, seconded by Lundy, moved that the Treas. refund the County Treas. \$112, as Markham's share for building culvert at Elgin Mills, Yonge Street.

James, seconded by Forster, moved that the Treas. pay our solicitor \$44 69, being cost for the Sidler vs. Township of Markham case, as certified by the Reeve, \$1 each, for tax, the not missing a day as certified upon oath, viz: Otto Giebner and K. Cunningham.

Mr. Wise gave evidence in reference to breaking his steam thrasher engine on 4th Con., on or before Sept. 14. He claims damages to the amount of \$24 or \$25.

Reesor, seconded by Forster, moved that the Treas. pay J. Boyton 7 00 for hauling 2,500 ft of plank and piling it on bridge between Lots 25 and 26 in 7th Con.

Forster, seconded by Reesor, moved that the Treas. pay L. Varent \$1 for repairing a bridge on 10th Con, Lot 23.

Reesor, seconded by Lundy, moved that Mr. Forster and the mover be commissioners to build a culvert on 8th Con, opposite Lot 1, and that the sum required be payable on order of commissioners when the work is completed.

Forster asked leave to introduce a By-law respecting public health. Leave given. On motion the By-law was read a first and second time, and the Council went into Committee of the whole thereon. Mr. Reesor in the chair. The committee rose and reported the By-law without amendment with blanks filled. On motion the report was adopted, and the By-law read a third time and passed.

James asked leave to introduce a By-law to set apart certain portions of the municipality into polling subdivisions for municipal elections. Leave given. On motion the By-law was read a first and second time, and the Council went into Committee of the whole thereon. Mr. Lundy in the chair. The Committee rose and reported the By-law without amendment. On motion the report was adopted and the By-law read a third time and passed.

Lundy, seconded by Forster, moved that the Treas. pay the following accounts, being two-thirds value of sheep killed by dog or dogs, owners unknown, as testified on oath: Ursan Humberway, 2 killed & 2 worried, \$22 75; Walter Crosby, 3 killed \$14; Wm. Armstrong, 7 killed and 5 worried, \$118 03.

James asked leave to introduce a By-law for holding municipal elections for 1884. Leave given. On motion the By-law was read the first and second time, and the Council went into Committee of the whole thereon. Mr. Reesor in the chair. The Committee rose and reported as follows: That the nominations be at Crosby's hall, Unionville Dec. 31 1883; election, Jan. 7, 1884, at the following places:

Div. 1—Thornhill, W. B. Wilson; 2—Elgin Mills, Edwin Slisley; 3—Brown's Cuthers, Thos. Thomson; 4—Victoria Square, John McCague; 5—Unionville, John Stephenson; 6—Casel, James Brodie; 7—Lot 8, Con. 2, George Bob; 8—Millville, E. W. Winger; 9—Cedar Grove, John McCaffrey; 10—Mongolia, James Lawrie.

The report was adopted, and the By-law read a third time and passed. On motion the Council adjourned until Saturday, Dec. 22nd.
