It is announced that Col. Clarke will be the Government nominee for the Speakership of the new Ontario Parliament.

The Government at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Jan. 22.—It looks as if the government did not intend to push business, and it is predicted that several days will be consumed doing little or nothing. The House sat only twenty minutes to-day.
Mr. Cameron (Huron) introduced an act to consolidate and amend the acts respecting the election of members of the House of Commons. A clause in the act provides for the punishment by imprisonment of members convicted of bribery. The bill was read a first time.
Mr. Charlton's sedition bill was read a first time amid jeers from the government benches.
Replying to Mr. Blake's enquiry, Sir John Macdonald gave some explanation regarding ministerial changes. Mr. McPherson was taken from the speakership of the Senate and created minister of the interior to relieve Sir John, who assumed the presidency of the council. The Indian department, instead of being under the charge of the minister of the interior, was now controlled by Sir John, who would give any information regarding it. He also has undertaken the charge of the mounted police department. Regarding the minister of railways, no ministerial change had been made and no explanation was necessary.
Mr. Blake congratulated Sir John on the change, as he deemed the duties of first minister sufficient for one man to perform.
The senate met and adjourned to attend the funeral of Senator Bourinot. The remains were sent to Sydney, C. B. Speculation is rife as to who will be the late Dr. Todd's successor as librarian. The names of Martin J. Griffin and Mr. Bourinot, clerk of the house, are mentioned in connection with the position. Should Mr. Griffin be appointed, it is stated that Mr. Edward Farrar will be offered the editorial chair of the *Mail*.—*World*.

Richmond Hill Council.

Pursuant to the statute, the following members elected to compose and form the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the village of Richmond Hill, for the year 1884, viz:—Reeve, John Brown; Councilors, Henry F. Hopper, Alexander Moodie, Robt. Law, met in the Council Chamber this day, at 11 a. m., and having severally made and subscribed their declarations of qualification and of office, took their seats. The minutes of the last meeting of the late Council were read.
Councillor Hopper asked leave to introduce By-law No. 102 for the appointment of High School Trustees, two auditors, and other officers to serve the Corporation for the year 1884, which was read a first time.
The following names were inserted in the blanks, viz:—J. A. E. Switzer, High School Trustee; J. K. Falconbridge and Parker Crosby, auditors; J. W. Elliott, Assessor; W. Bricekell, Inspector; J. Creek, D. Hopkins, and J. W. Elliott, Fence Viewers; Matthew Carr, Pound Keeper; and Francis Wiley, Bell Ringer.
The By-law was then read a second and third time and passed.
The following standing committees were struck, viz:—Fire and Water, Messrs. Moodie, Law and Hopper. Finance and Assessment, Brown, Crosby and Law. Streets and Sidewalks, all the members.
The Clerk read a petition from the members of the Richmond Hill Cornet Band, dated 16th Jan., which read as follows:—
Unto the Honorable Council of the Municipality of Richmond Hill:—
GENTLEMEN.—The petition of the undersigned members of the Richmond Hill Cornet Band humbly sheweth:—
That your petitioners—having no suitable room wherein to practice; and not feeling able to rent the same (as it is expensive buying instruments and music, as well as hiring a teacher) humbly ask your Honorable Body to rent the Temperance Hall for the use of said Band for one year (\$16 per annum) and we hereby pledge ourselves to play, free of charge, at concerts or evening entertainments in connection with our village Institutions, whenever called upon.
And your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

Davis, of King, were the members whom it was understood the contest would be between. On the first ballot Mr. Davis received 22 votes and Mr. Jackson 13. Mr. Davis was then declared elected. The standing committees were appointed and the council adjourned.

J. J. Hawkins will carry the Bothwell election ease to the supreme court.
It costs \$15 a day to keep the immigrant soup kitchen going at Winnipeg, Man.
The Winnipeg board of trade at a recent meeting heartily endorsed the Hudson Bay railway scheme.
The Election Appeals of Prescott, Lennox, South Victoria, and East Northumberland, have all been dismissed.
A London hotelkeeper is very proud of a candor that hatched out triplets in one day. He claims that it is the first case on record.
Female whisky detectives have succeeded in getting several convictions of grocery men in London, Ont., for selling liquor in illegal quantities.
A lively time is expected in the Rocky Mountain region when the railway construction is resumed. The mining, stock and lumbering industries are expected to undergo a great boom.
A novelty on the C. P. R. at Winnipeg, Man., the other day, was a train comprising sixteen cars containing nothing but snow. The railway has been kept running with very trifling delays.
The Montreal city council has passed a resolution authorizing the Mayor to sign the gas contract for ten years. The legality of the proceeding will be tested in court.
Mr. F. F. McPherson, Conservative M. P. for Mequeting, unseated, and J. J. Hawkins, M. P. for Bothwell, unseated, have both resolved to claim seats in Parliament pending the result of their appeals.
George Moffat of Turnbull, county of Huron, has received several letters from friends in the old country intimating that a legacy of \$330,000 sterling, by heirship, awaits him. He is taking the necessary steps to establish his claim.
A dispatch from Victoria, B. C., says that a stringent anti-Chinese bill will be introduced in the legislature, depriving it unlawful for Chinese to enter British Columbia, and imposing an annual tax on all Chinese over fourteen years of age.
Messrs. McDonald and Edward, Scotch delegates of Lady Cathcart, who visited Manitoba last summer, have on behalf of that lady purchased 50,000 acres of land in the Turtle mountain country, on which it is proposed to locate crofters from the Highland estates of Lady Cathcart.
