## Educational Minister's Report.

The annual report of the Minister of Education for 1882 is only now placed before the people. It appears, the total the system of this trouble, are pleasant to sum raised for Public School purposes take and contain their own cathartic. was, \$3,469,990; an increase of, \$210,-751 over 1881. The total outgoinge \$3,026,974; being increase of \$182.762. The average cost per pupil was \$6.03 in rural districts, \$6.86 for towns, and \$8 81 for cities, making an average for the whole Province of \$6.42. Children between five and sixteen in the Province in 1882, was 483,817; a decrease of 407 as compared with 1881. The total number on the registers of the P schools was 471.512; a decrease of 2,648. The total average attendance was 214,176 or 45 per cent. of the aggregate, the percentage for rual districts being 43, for cities 58, and for towns 53. The registered number of boys in school was 246,966; the number of girls was 224,546. In the 5203 schools, 6857 teachers were employed. The average salaries of male teachers in rural districts, towns and cities respectively, were \$385, \$576, and \$742; and of female teachers, \$248, \$273, and \$331. The average is, especially for females very low.

For High Schools the expenditure was \$343,700, the number of pupils 12,473, an average of \$29.30 each. Number of schools reported was, 104.

The attendance at University College for 1882-83 was 380, including students of the school of Practic Science, who got some of their tuitie from the professors of University colleg The latter portion of the report is tak rp with statistics of the Mechanics' It stitutes and art schools.

It requires a strong hand to control such would-be gentlemen as these, and that the innecent may not suffer with the guilty, it is just as well that the citizens of Guelph should know the names of those who were expelled from the college and behaved an hadly at the eration, and also the names of the four or five who were there to syinpathize with them and assist in their disgraceful conduct. Such young men should not escape public censure; and although we are opposed to the Ontario Government, we shall always support—as we have on former occasions- the president of the college in the most drastic messures to purify and keep the college pure, and to maintain the authority of those who are placed in charge. The names of those who were expelled so far as we can ascertain, are H. Mayor, from England; E. Walsh, from England; E. A. Begbie, from England; D. L. Herbert, from Scotland; G. H. Furner, from Teronto; T. G. Wilson, near Barrie.

The names of their sympathizers and assistants at the station are: H. Ashworth from England; T Jones, from Wales; E. P. Smith, from Post Hope; A Smith, from near Simcoe, county, Norfolk; H. Vivian, from Brantford. The initials in their names may not be correct in every case. but they are not far astray; and the object in giving them is to clear the great majority who are innocent, and teach others that such conduct cannot go unpunished.

Death of Cetews yo.

A despatch from London reports the death of Cetewayo, the famous Zalu chief-tain, who is said to have died of heart disease. He succeeded his father, Panda, as King of the Zulus in 1872. Three years later his aggressive policy and his persecutions of the missionaries involved him in a dispute with the government of Natal, and a war resulted. In January, 1879, his dominions were invaded by the British, under command of Lord Chelmsford. first, the valor and discipline of the Zulus enabled them to inflict several serious checks and one overwhelming defeat upon the invaders. But large reinforcements were sent out from England, and tetewayo's semy was niterly overthrown and his nower broken beyond recovery in the great battle of Ulundi.
