#### A TOWN HALL.

At the request of some ratepayers, the Roeve has called a public meeting for the purpose of taking into consideration the advisability of building a Town Hall. The meeting is to be held in the Council Chamber on Friday night, 20th inst.

In another column will be seen s communication from a Ratepayer, who seemingly calls in question the necessity of incurring further taxation for the purpose mentioned above. We take it that meither the Reeve nor even a majority of the ratepayers contemplate, at the present time, the building of a Town Hall, but the matter has been urged upon the Reeve's attention by certain ratepayers, and he, the Reeve, thought the best plan to adopt would be to call a public meeting to take the matter into consideration. Such a building must come sooner or later, and whether the time has arrived is for the majority of the ratepayers to say. Let a vote of the property holders be taken upon the question.

#### McCarthy Liquor License.

The Domirion Government is given have the McCarthy Liquor License Act in force this year. The necessary license boards have been duly appointed by the Government, and they have received instructions to proceed to business. In some cases, the inspectors have been appointed by new Commissioners, and probably application for licenses will be at once

We notice Mr J. T. Jones has been appointed chief Inspector for York and Mr. Isaac Crosby of this village sub-

The Provincial Government seems determined also to enforce its act, and year, 1883. to issue its licenses. It does seem as if the liquor sellers will have a somewhat lively time.

# Amendments to the Crooks Act

The Ontario Government's bill amend ing the Crooks Act is a very peculiar one. Some of the most stringent provisions of the McCarthy Act have been appropriated bodily, and the framer of the bill has frankly intimated the source from which he obtained by indicating it in the bill itself.

The most important change introduc ed is compelling the commissioners to Richmond Hill, Feby. 22nd, 1884. hold open court for the hearing of evidence for or against applications for license. The date of their meeting and a list of the applicants are to be publishen, the latter containing also a description of the place for which in each case a license is asked. This provision will enable those who are opposed to the granting of any particular license to take steps to prevent it, and to submit such evidence as they think likely to weigh with the commissioners. Closely connected with the above pro

vision is the recognition, to a limited ex tent, of the principle of local option, while the ratepayers in the same polling sub-division to the number of ten, have a right to petition against any proposed license, to state the grounds of their objection, and to furnish ev dence, it is permitted to a majority of the parliamentary electors of the sub-division to absolutely prevent the issue of the license by signing a petition for that purpose. This will be found to be one of the most useful provisions of the measure for the restriction of the traffic in towns and

The bill proposes to make the separation general between the grocery trade and the liquor traffic. This will take away from municipalities a responsibility which they have found very irksome, and do away with whatever injustice the present system inflicts on unlicensed
