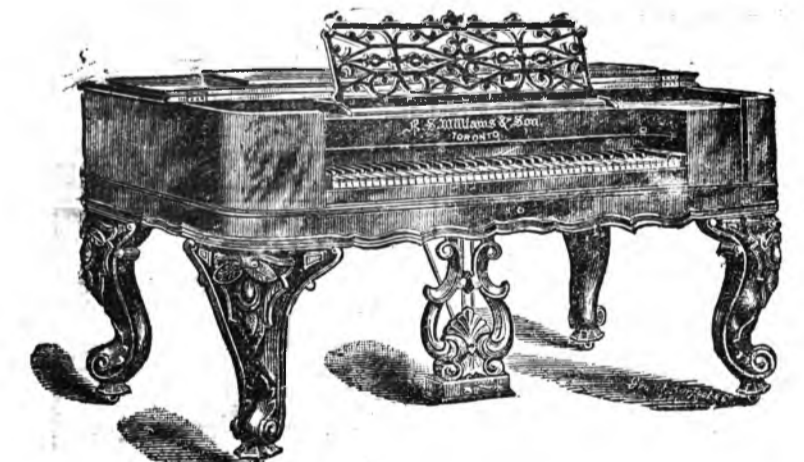

The Municipal Council of the Township of Vaughan, met at the Town Hall, on Tuesday, the 8th day of April, at 10 a.m.

The Revere in the chair. Members present, Messrs. Cook, Reaman, Malloy and Elliott.

The minutes of last meeting were read, and on motion approved.

An application was received from W. J. Rankin, requesting to be allowed to perform his statute labor on old Youge street, under the supervision of the pathmaster. It was laid over till next meeting.

Moved by Mr. Cook, seconded by Mr. A. Malloy, that the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay the following accounts:—

To T. F. McMahon, for painting, etc., \$2.00; T. F. McMahon, for printing 300 copies Township Accounts \$26.65; Blotting paper for use of Council, 35 cents; Donald McDonald's journey to Toronto, for seals, \$3.00.

Moved by Mr. Cook, seconded by Mr. A. Malloy, that the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay to the Vaughan Plowmen's Association the sum of twenty-five dollars in lieu of twenty dollars granted in 1883.

Moved by Mr. Malloy, seconded by Mr. Elliott, that the Clerk advertise according to section 506 and following subsections of the amended Act of 1883, for stopping up Public Highways in the village of Maple, of that portion of a plan, made by one Holmes of the N. W. quarter of lot 21, in the 3rd Con. of Vaughan, west of the railway.

Moved by Mr. Reaman seconded by Mr. Elliott, that the Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to pay the following Road Accounts as certified:—

To District No. 1, H. Rumble, for 105 loads of gravel, \$10.60; A Burkholder, for Lumber, \$11.75; Dis. No. 2, Jonathan Eleyer, for Lumber, \$3.00; Dis. No. 3, W. Patterson, for work done on side road between lots 25 and 26, in the 8th 10th Cons. of Vaughan.

Moved by Mr. Elliott, seconded by Mr. Malloy, that the Clerk be instructed to enquire from Mr. Fotheringham, the reeve of Woodbridge, in 1883, out of the Municipal Grant Assessment of 1882, in this Township.

Moved by Mr. Reaman, seconded by Mr. Cook, that the Clerk and Treasurer's office hours be from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Moved by Mr. Reaman, seconded by Mr. Cook, that the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to change the Bank Account from the Canadian Bank of Commerce to the Branch of the Central Bank at Richmond Hill.
