The Board of Education is considering a proposition that the younger pupils shall only attend school for three hours half of them coming in the morning, and the remainder in the afternoon. It is thought that the mental and physical better men can be found within five and healthy manner, than to attempt too See advertisement. the departure from the old way of doing things says: "where the experiment has been tried, the results have been satisfactory.

Should Hamilton report in favor of the change, it may lead to a thorough everhauling of our school system. It is, no doubt, but little benefit to young children to commence their school studies at too early an age. Seven instead of five years to begin school life would in our opinion be more beneficial to mental training than otherwise.

An exclusinge says :- " Probably the best way would be to shorten the hours for all under seven or eight, to allow them longer time on the play-ground, and to adopt during the rest of the time methods of instruction on the Kindergarten principle, which would convey simple lessons without taxing the capacity of the scholars severely.'
