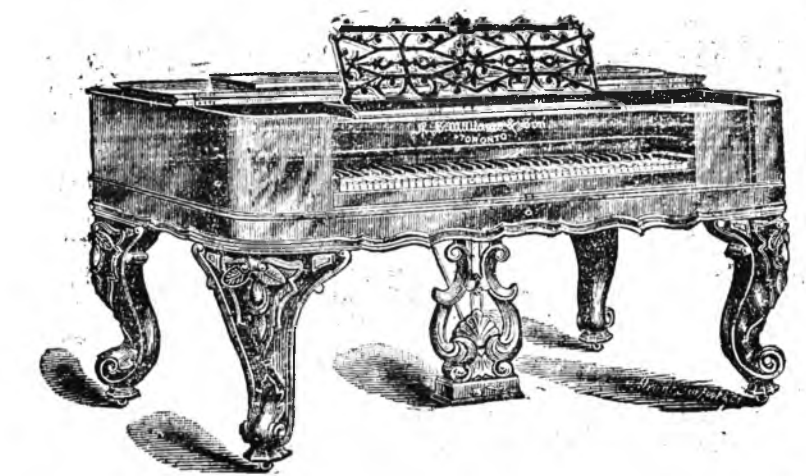

## Muskoka as a Grazing Country

THE LAND FOR RAISING CATTLE AND SHEEP—INTERVIEW WITH AN EXPERIENCED GENTLEMAN.

A World reporter on Monday last, had an interview with Frank Turner, C. E., of Bracadale, York Township, who has just returned from a visit to Muskoka. Mr. Turner is known as a shrewd observer, and his opinion on matters that have come under his notice carries considerable weight. What opinion have you formed of Muskoka? asked the reporter. I tell you, sir, this district of Ontario will undoubtedly become in a few years the great grazing country of the Province. Has it started any factories? Yes, a cheese factory has been established at Huntsville in the Township of Bruce, which promises to become a great success from the fact that its manager reports that he can make a pound of cheese from less milk by a quart than he succeeded in doing in other parts of Canada. How is this accounted for? The answer is simple enough. The grasses are more sweet and nourishing than those found in most places and on level land generally. Virgin soil will produce year after year a succession of these grasses without artificial aid other than that induced by the cattle feeding on them, and in this respect the pasture in Muskoka resembles the famous English downs. Sheep thrive immensely on these pastures, and the mutton they produce cannot be excelled anywhere. The ground is so interspersed with rock that cereals will not pay on most lands in Muskoka, and I think it is a great mistake on the part of the government to have distributed these lands in small areas of 100 acres. It is my opinion that not less than 1000 acres in block should have been meted out to each settler, and so have enabled a man with a small capital to make a respectable living as a stock raiser or grazier. Those who originally took up these small holdings of 100 acres only found themselves handicapped so that they could not make a living, and the result is that most of the free grant settlers have abandoned their lots, and the painful sight of deserted homes meets the traveller all along the roads. Were it not for the occasional tinkling of the bells attached to the cattle and sheep, one might fancy that the country was without inhabitants and not fit for settlement.

**Strength of British Arms in Egypt and the Sudan.**

LONDON, Aug. 11.—The British force in Egypt now number 8000. It will be raised to 10,000.

In the commons to-day the Marquis of Hartington said it would be impolitic to describe the steps the Government was about to take for the relief of Gordon. Certain preparations were progressing. Sir Stafford Northcote moved an address to the Crown, praying that the House might be informed of the details of Lord Northbrook's mission to Egypt. He expressed gratification at the collapse of the Egyptian conference.

Gladstone said Earl Northbrook was sent to Egypt to make enquiry and advise the Government concerning the new position the Sudan disasters and the Egyptian financial troubles had created.

Judge Dean of the County Court of Victoria has been appointed to act as third arbitrator with James E. Smith and Wm. Mulock, M. P., in the city of Toronto, in respect to matters in difference between Toronto and County of York arising out of the extension of the city limits.

Of the four original proprietors of the London Daily Telegraph, a paper that now nets a profit of \$16,000 weekly, the sole survivor is now the owner of a country weekly, and another died in a poor-house.
