IN CHANCERY.

IMMENSE FORTUNES IN THE ENGLISH COURTS AWAITING CLAIMANTS.

From the "London Telegraph."

Enormous sums of money are now going begging, simply waiting for somebody to claim them. Why do not the persons entitled to the dormant funds in Chancery step forward and by disclosing their existence and their names become the happy possessors of substantial fortunes for the rest of their natural lives? The explanation of the remarkable fact that £77,000,000 were at the beginning of last year locked up somewhere in the office or under the control of the paymaster General in Chancery must surely lie in the ignorance of those who have a rightful claim to any portion of the wealth. It is impossible to conceive that they have all taken a vow of life-long poverty, like the early monks, or that they are hated of filthy lucre like Timon, or that they have shared the fate of the Seven Sleepers, and are oblivious to subsidiary matters altogether. Since the historic case of "Jarndyce vs Jarndyce" was concluded—if it ever has been concluded—nothing more extraordinary has occurred in the history of the Court of Chancery than this continued heaping up of untold gold, which nobody takes the trouble to claim, or even to make very active inquiries about.

The natural and obvious result of such extraordinary callousness is that the majestic sun in question goes on steadily increasing. It heaps up interest, and there is no one to gather it. In February, 1873, the total amount was over £55,000,000; ten years later it had risen to £75,000,000; and if Chancellors of the Exchequer had not caught sight of the hoard, and if a portion had not been used for national purposes, there is no saying to what figure the whole would not have mounted up by the beginning of the twentieth century. These facts are recalled to public attention at the present moment because of the publication in the "London Gazette" of a long list of the names over £50 which are due to the Court of Chancery. There are more than 6,000 names mentioned in the supplement to the "Gazette" as entitled to claim sums of upward of £50; but whether they have a right to £100 or £100,000 requires the employment of a legal adviser.
