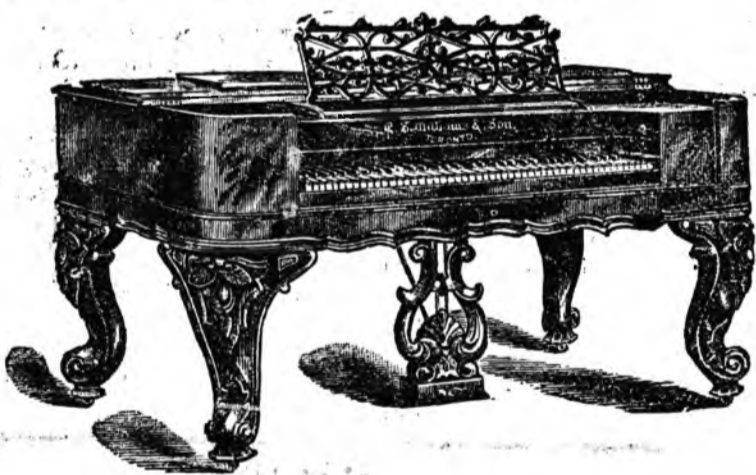

Delicious Little Fried Cakes.
Beat two eggs well, add to them one ounce of sifted sugar and two ounces of warmed butter, two table-spoonfuls of yeast, a teaspoonful of lukewarm milk and a little salt. Whip all well together, then stir in by degrees one pound of flour, and if requisite, more milk, making this dough. Beat it until it falls from the spoon, then set it to rise. When it has risen, make butter or lard hot in a frying-pan, cut from the light dough little pieces the size of a walnut, and without moulding or kneading, fry them pale brown. As they are done, lay them on a napkin to absorb any of the fat.
