## The Bible in our Schools.

The following regulations have been approved by the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council, on the 16th day of December, 1884.

1. Every Public and High School shall be opened with the Lord's Prayer, or the prayer sanctioned by the Department of Education.
2. The portion of scripture used shall be taken from selections authorized for that purpose by the Department of Education, and shall be read without comment or explanation.
3. Where a teacher claims to have conscientious scruples against opening and closing the school as herein provided, he shall notify the trustees to that effect in writing.
4. No pupil shall be required to take part in the exercises above referred to against the wishes of his parents or guardian, expressed in writing to the master of his school.
5. When required by the trustees the Ten Commandments shall be repeated at least once a week.
6. The trustees shall place a copy of the authorized readings in each department of the Public and High Schools under their jurisdiction, within one year of the date thereof.
7. The clergy of any denomination, or their authorized representatives, shall have the right to give religious instructions to the pupils at their own church, in each school house at least once a week, after the hour of the closing of the school house in the afternoon, and if the clergy of more than one denomination apply to give religious instructions in the same school house, the school board or trustees shall decide on what day of the week the school house shall be at the disposal of the clergyman of each denomination, at the time above stated. But it shall be lawful for the school board or trustees and clergyman or his authorized representative, may give religious instruction to the pupils of his own church, provided it be not during the regular hours of the school.

SEVENTY-FIVE VOLUNTEERS TO GO ON TO KHARTOUM.

The Governor-General has received a cablegram from the British Government stating that about 250 of the Canadian Voyageurs who joined General Wolseley's expedition, will leave Alexandria, Egypt, on Feb 6th for Canada. Seventy-five have volunteered to continue with the expedition to Khartoum for six months. The term for which the men enlisted expires on March 9th.

**Hamilton's Chief.**  
RICHARD K. FOX GIVES A PICTURE AND SKETCH OF A. D. STEWART.

From the National Police Gazette, Jan. 17. Alexander D. Stewart is the chief of the Hamilton (Canada) police, and was born at Leith, Scotland, on Sept. 19, 1852. He comes of an excellent Scottish family and is a near relative of Lord Blantyre and other members of the British aristocracy. He was educated at St. Andrew's and Edinburgh Universities and is a man of considerable culture. His height is 6 feet 4 inches and his weight 220 pounds. Although retired from public competitions Mr. Stewart is, without doubt, the best all-round amateur athlete in Canada. He pulls a strong row, is a fine but not magnificent cover point in cricket, an effective football player, a splendid boxer, an admirable fencer and swimmer, a first class or ss-country rider, a good gymnast, and holds over eighty cups and medals for proficiency in these and other branches of athletics. He has met and generally defeated many of the best men on this as well as the other side of the water. Mr. Stewart is vice-president of the Canadian Association of Amateur Athletes, and has beyond question done as much as, if not more, than any man in Canada to advance the best interests of honest and legitimate sports of all kinds. He is a recognized authority on questions of this nature, and besides being a general amateur athlete is a fair and impartial settler of disputes. He was appointed to his present position on Sept. 22, 1880, since when he has steadily grown in public confidence and has made his force almost a model of efficiency and efficiency.
