Fourth Annual Convention

OF THE S. SCHOOL ASSOCIATION OF VAUGHAN.

The fourth annual convention of the township of Vaughan Sabbath School Association was held in Hope Methodist Church, fourth concession, on Wednesday and Thursday last, and was triumphantly attended, considering the inclemency of the weather. Mr. Burkhoffer, godfather of the singing at all the sessions, and Mr. Hurdy, of Woodbridge, presided at the organ. The convention was greatly indebted to both those persons for the able manner in which they performed their respective duties.

The first session commenced on Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Mr. L. Lock, President of the Association, occupied the chair, and called the convention to order. After devotional exercises, the President delivered the introductory address, in which he reviewed the proceedings of the past year, and congratulated the convention on the very favorable circumstances in which they were now placed.

Various committees were appointed to arrange the business of the future session. The Secretary presented the report of the Executive, which contained several items of great interest. There are 19 schools in the township, from 13 of which reports had been received, all of which contained many interesting facts, illustrative of the progress of the respective schools. The number of conversions reported was 62.

The general topic of the programme was "Soil, seed, sower, and harvest." Mr. J. Kager introduced the first subject, "How we educate the quarterly review in our Sabbath school." The speaker gave a very practical address, after which a conversation was held, in which several members took part. The session was one of great utility.

The evening session commenced at 7 o'clock and continued until 10. The attendance was greatly increased. Brotherly greetings were addressed by the Rev. M. Fawcett, Pastor of the Church, to which the Rev. A. Sherwood responded in an appropriate manner.

The Rev. J. McEwen, General Secretary of the Provincial Sabbath School Association, delivered an earnest and eloquent address on "The Soil," which was followed by another appropriate address on "Its Needs," by the Rev. J. Rankin. Several appropriate remarks were made by different speakers.

SECOND DAY'S SESSION.

The second day's session was commenced at 9:30. Prayer and praise occupied 20 minutes. After reading the minutes of the previous session, reports were called for. The business committee made their report, one item of which was that the next meeting of the convention should be held at Kleinberg. The report was accepted.

The Treasurer's and Finance Committee's report was presented, from which it was shown that the sum of \$9.15 was on the right side of the ledger.

Addresses on "The Seed—The Word—A Companion," by Rev. A. McLaughlin; and on "The Word—A Weapon," by the Rev. W. B. Booth, were delivered.

The afternoon session commenced at two o'clock. After devotional exercises the minutes of the previous session were read and adopted. "The Sower, which is the Teacher," was the subject of discussion; "In His Study," by Rev. D. Cameron; "In His Closet," by Rev. J. W. Tuffin; "In His Class," by Rev. J. McEwen. The addresses were cordially received, and elicited a very profitable discussion.

The following officers were appointed:—John Gradidge, President; Henry Brown, Secretary; John Gilkie, Treasurer. The various communications in the township are represented on the Executive Committee.

A collection was taken up for the funds of the Provincial Sabbath School Association.

One very interesting feature of the session was the Question Draw, which was in charge of the Rev. John McEwen, whose answers were for the most part true and graphic.

A resolution of thanks to the Rev. John McEwen was very cordially and unanimously adopted by the convention for his services during the sessions. His labors as Sunday School Agent are very onerous and self-denying, and are of great value to the institution in which he is engaged.

The last session commenced at seven o'clock. After twenty minutes' devotional exercises, the minutes of the previous session were read and adopted. The Rev. A. McEwen, President of the Association, occupied the chair and delivered his introductory address. The retiring President, Mr. L. Lock, congratulated his successor, and expressed a hope that he would have great success during his term of office.

The topic of the evening was "The Sower, which is the Harvest." In our Family, by Rev. A. McLaughlin; in our Church, by Rev. Edward Hays, M. A.; in Heaven, by Rev. J. Rankin. It was a matter of regret that two of the ministers who were announced for the evening session did not arrive. The session was closed about ten o'clock, all being pleased with the service.
