

THE LADY OF THE WHITE HOUSE. Mrs. Elizabeth Cleveland, the lady at the head of the White House, seems to be a pretty vigorous person, if we may judge from the following article from her pen, which appeared three years ago in the *Youth's Temperance Banner*. When writing this pamphlet on Mrs. Hayes, she could little have imagined she was committing herself. Her circumstances are, however, somewhat different from those of Mrs. Hayes, who was mistress of the situation, while she acknowledges that she cannot control her brother:—

J. C. Holland wrote in Mrs. Hayes' album these words: "Women only can make wine-drinking unbecomingly, and heal the Nation of this curse." What did Dr. Holland mean by "women only?" Is it true that only women can make wine-drinking unbecomingly and heal the Nation of this curse? You and I need to know this first, because if only we women can do this thing, why it is an awful responsibility upon us, each one of us. And if somebody else can do it, we like all the others, would like to give it somebody else the job. It was too utterly queer! So Mrs. Hayes made one exception in favor of those great foreign highnesses, and allowed wine upon her table in their presence. But only for once. Her conscience—high souled woman that she is!—smote her for that one little cowardly compromise with wrong. She could better endure to have Secretary Everts and the Smiths ashamed of her, than to be ashamed of herself. So she quietly and forever after prohibited wine from her table, and cheerfully endured the lifted eyebrows and slanted shoulders of the diplomats, the British, French, Russian, all, and the little short-lived hiss of "fashionable" society, until that hiss turned to a cheer, and fashionable society turned round, like the spaniel it is, and trotted on behind its mistress. 


