Election of School Trustees.

Under the statutes of Ontario, 1885, the Board of Public School Trustees, or the Board of Education in any city, town, incorporated village or township in which a Township Board has been established, may, by resolution, of which notice shall be given to the Clerk of the Municipality on or before the first day of October in any year, require the election for the School Trustees in such city, town, incorporated village, or township, to be held on the same day, and in the same manner as Municipal Councilors, or Aldermen are elected, as the case may be.

Riel Condemned to Death.

The jury in Riel's case has found him guilty of high treason, adding a recommendation to mercy, which probably means that they think he is not wholly sane, and he has been sentenced to be hanged on September 18th.
