Instead of endeavoring to break up the Union of the Provinces, it would be more oreditable if the Liberal Government, who now hold power in Nova Scotia, initiated some practical way whereby the three Provinces down by the sea could unite in one Parliament. They then would not only be able to carry on the duties of Government more cheaply and at less expense, but their powers as a factor in the Dominion Parliament and Government would be more felt and more respected than it is at present. And then, if unfortunately they were not the large number of Orientals attending satisfied with Confederation they could go with more force to the Home Government asking to be freed from a Union of which some at least down there seem to think is the cause of bad times, bad health, and every other fault or failing of which the human system is subjecto.
