Sir,—Having been some years on a literary sentimental journey almost like the famous Captain Cook round the world, substantially and metaphorically, also traversed barren plains, dreary woodlands then hills or valleys of rich foliage, scented air and verdant fields, I have come to decided conclusions that many intelligent persons of influential surroundings labor under extraordinary delusions that a political party necessarily becomes at once broken up beyond recovery when great Leaders withdraw from office, whereas we ought to know that the old truce stares us in the face "there's as good fish in the sea as ever came out." We are led to imagine that when Sir John as one unsurpassed Leader, quita the reins, Conservatism in Canada will melt away like snow in August's hot sun. There are, naturally, plenty good men and true, although not so eminent, left to carry the old flag, and through thick and thin sustain it in most of its original grandeur and power. Canada's position was never better than in A. D. 1886 under Tory rule. All material laws of the land are made *ab initio* with commonly placed on a sound footing requiring little annual tinkering as of yore. What more can we reasonably want? Sir John and Hon.
