(ADVERTISEMENT.)

To the Editor of the Herald.

Sir—Having devoted many weekly long letters in the HERALD upon the subject of "Far too many Legislators" since October last which may have been interesting to your readers, on the occasion I wish to dwell and centre my views not so generally, but upon one specific theme, of great public importance. It relates to a Reform of the highest authority in Ontario; so it becomes me to be well guarded on all points so as to create no immoderate sensation or useless controversy in reply, nor vent outside of strict legal limits. Every intelligent man in Canada possesses indisputable rights in matters of public interest, or private rights, to reasonably comment thereon, provided this is done with fair and honest intention. Such are not, in law, libellous or matter how severe in terms. All criticism should be couched in temperate language, and different from Hon. S. H. Blake's style; i. e., not coarse, and particularly unduly of malice, open or insinuated. Of course we are aware in the majority of instances, as pointed out by Courts libellous to imply injury to any man, charging a Government official, by charging that he has been guilty of improper conduct in such office, or has been actuated by wicked or selfish motives, or is incompetent to discharge his functions with usefulness and dignity to the State, and public at large. Again, some persons labor under false impressions that it is the sole peculiar privilege of the Premier to write on upon public actions of public men, but that is a grand mistake—every citizen has equal right. My subject relates to an Eminent Estate—the official referred to being the Hon. Oliver Mowat, Attorney-General and Premier of Ontario. In brief the following facts are derived from correspondence of the only person interested in said Estate, viz: Hon. John Campbell Hutchinson (a literary writer) having ascertained that in his absence abroad certain conspirators had committed forgery, letter stealing, and executed fraudulent instruments besides registering them, all for the purpose of defrauding or preventing him ever succeeding to the estate of his uncle, which eventually would escheat to the Crown for disposal to legal heir of original grantee—Mr. H. wrote a long letter to Attorney-General Mowat (some eight pages, writing on foolscap paper) setting forth the crimes with every minute detail of the whole case, expecting that officer would do his duty so far as he could at that time, attend to punishing crime, and uphold law, not smooth over, or compound felonies by shutting his eyes to them. The Premier being considered such a decided worthy moralising legal light—just fresh from the High Court of Justice, as an eminent Vice-Chancellor, he would be amazed, no doubt, at the startling vilification expounded by Mr. Hutchinson; the public therefore will reasonably expect to learn that after considering said information he would have answered something as follows (in effect it not exact words as I put it, viz: "Dec 26th, 1872

Sir—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter dated 3rd inst., and after going carefully through the alleged forged charges you make of forgery, letter stealing, &c., touching the estate of your uncle, I must say it is a very serious affair, which, not being under jurisdiction of the Courts, but under control of the Crown, only—it will be my pleasure and duty to look into it. I must compliment you, firstly, for devoting two years hard study as a literary man in newspapers to promote Reform interests, especially as your labor of brain and pen were bestowed in your leisure hours at the Government desire to thank you for that portion of your letter in which you inform me the Solicitor acting for your adversaries against you had used by said Attorney-General Sandfield Macdonald in Oct., 1869 into persuading him to grant a Patent of the Land to his client, which said office of course refused—and for conduct in putting me on guard should said Solicitor try the same surprise trick on me—we he failed on Sandfield.

Secondly, by one of your uncle's executors in a crime for which in olden times he would have suffered death—Letter stealing the same. Then according to your uncle's will he bequeathed only life estate to your aunt; at her death the land was to revert to Alexander, your cousin. The will does not intend or say that if he died first—the land was to be your aunt's, so that deed of a lease made of your uncle's estate was a FRAUD which said Sandfield would see at once, in 1869. Evidently you can have no possible object in writing me as you have done but to state facts. I have no doubt of your honesty and truthfulness; as soon as I can see the Solicitor, who appears to have been employed in this criminal business, I will communicate what you must then do.

O. Mowat

Such a sensible letter Mr. Mowat should have written, but it did not suit his purposes to do so. Why? Mr. H. it appears, was held in high estimation by Hon. Edward Blake at that period and usually expounded his successor, Hon. Mr. Mowat, would lawfully extend to him every justice that young "Solicitor" above noted, by remote family connections was allied to Hutchinson's kindred—therefore cannot be called entirely disinterested in those illegal deed transactions; his father was an eminent Judge in High Courts; Mr. H. believes and Mr. Mowat was friendly since boyhood together. Whether the father knew of his son's pranks is not known. Whether Hon. Mr. Mowat corresponded with the son—not the father—about this trouble is (as yet) also unknown. However this much is known and Premier Mowat is utterly unable to disprove facts, that he took three weeks to send the correspondence, and I am ashamed to inform the public generally through your columns he wrote to Mr. Hutchinson simply stating in, seven lines, and **CONFESSING HE HAD GONE CAREFULLY OVER THE CORRESPONDENCE BUT CONSIDERED (Mr. H.) HAD NO MORAL (!!!) OR LEGAL RIGHT TO THE LAND IN QUESTION!!!**

Now what can the public O. H. think of that determined bluffing off? What about the forgery? The fraud on Sandfield? The letter stealing, &c. Not one word I'll smooth over, we suppose, between said Mowat and this young lawyer? Compounding offences like this is no child's play by an Attorney-General. Finally in 1873, the Privy Council in England decided that the Dominion Government was not entitled to Ontario Escheats; then Mr. Hutchinson petitioned the Local Government for favor of his uncle's small escheated farm; in reply to which the Attorney-General made and passed an Order-in-Council in April, 1874, declaring the several (illegal) deeds valid, and that the present owner who purchased the Estate for \$2,000 from the HERALD MAN about three years previously should be confirmed owner of the land! The present purchaser to stand owner with legal title should have made his bargain with the Crown who was owner at the time; but his paying \$2,000 to the hired man for a conveyance from one word is utterly lost money; I fear. The hired man never owned the place by any lawful in-

strument! The Attorney-General is unable to disprove his own words—in his own order-in-council on record for any person to examine? The consequences of this absurdly ignoring Mr. Hutchinson's petition of 1873 that he has lost time and capital in writing and waiting patiently fifteen years! since his arrival from abroad and this ending and loss is the peculiar Gilt gratitude shown him by the "Christian Premier" for his incessant if every effort in Reform interest from 1869 to 1874 published scores of newspapers. Oh! take a breath—Mr. Editor! What a dark crusade against the philanthropist? I have very carefully examined into this miserable scandal, therefore have the means of knowing precisely as I have stated. I think it an affair which Hon. Mr. Meredith should early pay attention to, if even too late for benefiting the injured one. Mention it is not an ordinary subject which the Press just yet can lawfully much comment upon, and on his own motion only in a (compelled) to assume all risk—all responsibility brought up to this inception. If you, Mr. Editor are called upon to disclose my name, very good! I must bend to law requiring that, of course, but at present in a literary capacity I have also lawful right to assume any sensible, proper name I please, which, in the public interest appears to me most useful to society under the whole circumstances. Personally I have no special motive of malice towards Hon. Mr. Mowat, privately or publicly, for, if so happens I never spoke to him, or he to me. I simply like to see good laws of the land honestly carried out, no matter who it "displeases" or "offends" and will always assist therein so far as in me lay, regardless whether the oppressed one be small as a mouse or big as a mountain. The idea of allowing Hutchinson's hired man to sell the land and on his own motion only in a (compelled) ridiculous, who! Mr. Meredith and also the legal heir of Testator at sometime. Is Mowat a "dreamer?"
