

At North York Fair, at Newmarket, they took seven first prizes, including peu and sweepstakes, and three second prizes. At East York Fair, at Markham, with four entries, they took three first

could be brought against them in the Dominion. Our Washington Letter.

(From our own Correspondent.) A question of interest to all Government

employes in connection with the annual leave of absence has been decided by the Secretary of War. A civiliau employe of he Signal Office recently sent a communication to the Secretary complaining that he had been unjustly treated in having the Fourth of July and the preceding day, Sunday, charged against him for absence from duty, requesting that the two days' pay so deducted be refunded. He stated that on June 21, 1887, he had been granted sixteen days four and a half hours leave of absence with pay for 1887, entitling him to thirteen days two hours to make up full thirty days eave with pay for the year. which it is the custom of the War Department to grant. On the day mentioned above he received from the Signal Office twelve days leave with pay, to expire on the second of July leaving still due a day and a fraction o leave. July 3 was Sunday and July 4 was a public holiday, and on neither of those days could he have entered the Signal Office without a pass, the office being closed so far as his duties were concerned. Because unusual delay in the arrival at her destination of a steamer on which he was a passenger be was unable to report in person or duty on the morning of July 5, but did report by telegraph. On the sixth, being then present, he asked to have his absence on the fifth applied against the day's leave still due him. The chief Signal Officer held, however, that his leave expired or the 2nd of July, but extended his leave to include July 3, 4 and 5, two days of which to be without pay. The employe, in his letter to the Secretary of War, respectfully absence of plication from him for an "extension." the Signal Office was not warranted in creating one for him; that the office had no right to assume his inability to perform Government service on two days when he would not have been permitted to enter its rooms By direction of the Secretary of War. formed that in a similar case the Secretary of War decided that for short absences, in which Sunday does not occur, Sunday should not be considered, and that, there-fore, desultory absences, of one day or less. should be estimated by reckoning seven hours as the day, but for any leave during which Sunday occurs the Sunday should be counted in the leave. The same rule will apply to holidays occurring during an absence, and therefore July 3 and 4 were properly charged in this case. 
