Our Washington Letter.

(From our own Correspondent)

WASHINGTON, JAN. 23, 1888.

The arrangements for the important
celebrations of 1889 and 1892 are progressing
satisfactorily. It is proposed to hold
both of them here in Washington, the first
being the centenary of the Constitution of
these United States and the second a world's
exposition in honor of the four hundredth
anniversary of the discovery of America.

The project is one which appeals to the
patriotic and deepest sentiment of every
American heart.

Much abused, or violated, as the Con-
stitution may have been, it was framed by
men who were wiser than their day, and it
has served ever since to protect and pre-
serve the liberty and lives of the greatest
and freest people the world has ever known.

Under it the country has grown and pro-
gressed, and intelligent nations now ex-
ists, and, besides, it is an instrument which
commands the respect of all the civilized
powers and people of the earth. It stands
higher in the esteem even of the English
people themselves than their boasted
Magna Charta, and it will so stand until
the crack of doom. Every American is proud
of it, and it has set the example for the
freedom of nearly all the republics of the
globe.

The republicans of the house continued
their fight on Carlisle Saturday morning,
refusing to vote so as to break a quorum.
When it was shown that there was not a
quorum of democrats present Mr. Crisp
moved an adjournment, which was taken
after a roll call. Nearly 35 democrats
were away when their votes were needed,
most of them having gone to New York.
They have all been telegraphed for, and it
is expected that there will be a quorum
present to-day. There is a feeling of re-
sentment on the part of the majority of the
House at the absence of the needed mem-
bers at this time. It is said that more than
sixty republicans, after reading the reports
and affidavits in the case, volunteered their
personal assurance to Mr. Carlisle that
they were going to vote for him, and not
take part in a fight.

Circulars sent to the clerks of the Navy
Department from the Secretary's office,
asking each one to state what, if any, are
his business employments from which he
derives a revenue outside of his Govern-
ment work, have brought out some very
curious information. It appears that a
very large proportion of the clerks are en-
gaged in some sort of private occupation,
which brings them compensation. One
clerk writes that he is proprietor of a well
known private school in the city with which
his name has never had a public connection.
Quite a number of the clerks are newspaper
correspondents. One reports a profitable
relation to a Presbyterian church. The in-
formation derived from the circular will
probably warrant the secretary in making
some changes in the clerical force of the
department. The Navy Department clerks
have had very easy berths, but there are
faithful workers there who will never be
disturbed.

I hear that Mr. Sefton Brown, the long
time chief clerk of the State Department,
contemplates resigning his place. He has
been so long in the office because he has
a desirable opportunity engaged in
private business or else that he may enter
some other branch of the public service.
He could have had a good place in the
foreign service long ago if he had not
obligingly yielded to the wishes of the
successive Secretaries of State who desired
him to remain in the department. Mr. Brown
came here from Auburn, N. Y., with Mr. Seward,
and has a knowledge of our governmental
affairs which is possessed by very few men.

While the ways and means committee is
not holding any tariff sessions the majority
of the committee are hard at work on a bill.
They are working very quietly, and are
very hopeful of success. There has been
no formal canvass of the House on the
question, but in an informal way many
members have been sounded. A bill will
be reported at an early date, and there will
probably be little if any opposition to its
consideration. The indications are that
the matter will be taken up in a spirit of
conciliation as far as the two factions of
the party is concerned, and a bill will come
out of the committee of the whole in such
a shape as to secure the votes of a majority
of the House though it will be scarcely
what any of them would have if they could
get just what they want.
