ACCIDENT.—While returning from church on Sunday, at White Horse, the family of Mr. John Beynon of Vaughan, had a very narrow escape. The pole of the carriage slipped, allowing the vehicle to run upon the horses, which became unmanageable and ran away. Miss Maggie Beynon was seriously injured, and several others received bruises.

FINED.—Mr. McCool, principal of Hanover public school, was fined \$1 and costs by a local magistrate a short time ago, for giving a boy in his school five slaps on the hand with a small rubber strap. Mr. McCool appealed, and the case came up at Grey County Court held at Owen Sound a few days ago. The respondent, Bryden, failed to appear, consequently the conviction was quashed.

AN ACCIDENT.—A fatal accident occurred Thursday afternoon at Thorp's Saw Mill, about three miles from Mount Forest causing the death of Peter McIntyre and severe injury to John Sevil. The men were engaged sawing lumber when, without moment's warning, the boiler burst throwing steam and hot water over the whole building. Peter McIntyre was badly scalded and died in about two hours.

THORNHILL, JULY 1ST.—Burglars made another break here on Friday night, and plundered two stores in the village. Miss Weeks' general store received a visit from the marauders, who depleted the stock in that lady's store to the extent of twenty or thirty dollars worth of dry goods and cutlery. The other establishment entered was Hazelton's tobacco and cigar store stealing many dollars worth of goods.

BE CAREFUL.—The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania has decided that a civil contract is it no sense a religious affair, and therefore that Sunday marriages are not legal, the Sunday law prohibiting the making of contracts on that day. The decision affects many persons in that State, especially among the Germans. In some sections of the State nearly all the marriages that have taken place for years have occurred on Sunday.

R. T. OF T.—Royal Templars of Temperance met last Tuesday in their council chamber. In the absence of the S. Concllour, Mr. J. Sanderson took the chair. After the business was over the members spent the evening asking questions for the good of the order, and some good ones were given which received prompt answers. The installation of officers was postponed till next Tuesday evening when a full council is expected.

WOODBRIDGE NEWS.—Judge Morgan at a Divisional Court suit dismissed a case on the following grounds. A baker sued for one week's wages for peremptory dismissal and eleven hours overtime. He held that the agreement entered into with the Baker's Union by the employer, by which he agreed to the terms now sued for was not binding, and that the employer had a right to require his workmen to work overtime when required.

GIVE HIM TWENTY-FIVE.—On Monday evening the Toronto police at the Island came across a boy about 12 years of age in a helpless condition through liquor. A doctor after considerable trouble brought him too. He then stated a man had persuaded him to partake of liquor out of a bottle. Twenty-five stripes and three months imprisonment would fit in just about here. We trust the party may be caught and get his just desert.

NOT WANTED.—Methodist conference sometimes send men to stations and circuits who are not wanted. Listowel is a case in point, and now we learn from the Spectator that the officials of the Centenary church, Hamilton, have decided to reduce their stated salary to their preacher from \$2,500 to \$1,500, because the conference sent them one they didn't want. The ground taken is that those who pay should have a say in the matter. The First church of the same city is also kicking. It wanted C. O.
