1. Equal Rights for all classes and creeds. Stand for Canada before party in resisting French and clerical aggression.

3. Abolish the Separate Schools and have the English language taught to all citizens.
4. Abolish School Book monopoly and make Schools more efficient.
5. Prohibition of the Liquor Traffic and the placing of Licenses, so long as they continue, and civil service appointments in the hands of a Non-Partisan Commission.
6. Registration shortly before Elections to save the expense and complications attending the present system and also a secret ballot.
7. The continuance of the National Policy, so long as the United States maintain present attitude.
8. The preservation and development of mineral and timber interests.
9. Make Elections come on a fixed day so that neither party could surprise the other by springing an election on the country.
10. Place the redistribution of constituencies in Ontario with the Judges of the Court of Appeal.
11. Before capital gets the hold upon our country that it has upon the United States, the position of those who labor should be made unassailable.
12. Honesty, economy and efficiency in all appointments.
With the above amendments the strong holds of the hoodlums, office-seekers and those who trade upon race and creed for place and power would be broken down, and many a home now destitute and desolated would be made comfortable and happy.
