POSTPONED—The lacrosse match between the White Rose Club of this place and the Maitlands of Toronto, which was expected to take place on Saturday next, has been indefinitely postponed.

METHODIST CHURCH—In the absence of Rev. Mr. Foye, who it was announced was to have filled the pulpit of the Methodist Church here, on Sunday evening last, Mrs. Lloyd, of this village, conducted the services.

CANADIAN Temperance League has completed plans for work for another season. An engagement has been made with Mr. Joe Hess to remain in Canada for an entire year, commencing in September, lecturing and organizing for the league.

ANOTHER ONE—The Opposition candidate in Prince Edward county having been returned by a majority of one at the election on 5th June, strange to say on a recount the Ministerialist has secured the seat by eight of a majority.

SURROGATE COURT—In the Surrogate Court last week, Mr. Henry Nason, of Winnipeg, proved the will of the late Mr. W. Nason, Weston. His estate is valued at \$22,342. A grandchild of the deceased gets \$500 of this amount, and the residue is left to the widow of the deceased. At her death the estate goes to the benefit of the sons and daughters of the deceased and their descendants.

LATE—The citizens of the Hill who expected their Toronto morning papers before noon on Monday, were sadly disappointed as they were not delivered until late in the evening; and not until night set in and the shades of evening cast a pall over the land did the long looked for and long-expected papers from the prosperous and growing Queen city of the West come to hand. Whose fault or whose mistake it was we know not.

THE will of the late Leonard Kester, of Markham, was filed for probate on Tuesday. He left a farm worth \$3,000 to his son, Melville Kester; a house and lot at Markham and \$100 a year to his widow, and to his two daughters he left his personal property, less \$100 for a monument.

MANITOBA EXCURSION—The first farmers' excursion to Manitoba for the season over the C. P. R. left on Tuesday with five extra cars containing about 240 passengers. The farmers are going out to Manitoba and the Northwest Territory to see the crops and prospects for farming.

It is an exceptionally fine one and devolves great credit upon Mr. Kelly. He started at the brickwork of Mr. John Palmer's new residence, here, on Monday last.

VOTERS' LIST—The voters' list for the village of Stouffville for the year 1890, has just been printed. The list contains 357 voters; 266 are entitled to vote at both municipal elections and elections to the Legislative Assembly; 75 can vote at municipal elections only, and 16 are qualified to vote at elections for the Legislative Assembly only.—Tribune.

SMALL POTATOES—We have been credibly informed that a printed circular was issued from the Head Quarters of Dr. Gilmour, just previous to the last local election, to which was attached the name of N. C. Wallace, the purpose of which circular was to induce the friends of that gentleman to vote for "truth and righteousness" in the person of the doctor.

FIRE BRIGADE MEETING—A special meeting of Richmond Hill Fire Brigade was held on Monday evening last for the purpose of devising ways and means to procure new uniforms and a committee was struck to solicit subscriptions for the same. A letter was also read from the Galt tournament committee enclosing a cheque for \$40, and the thanks of the townspeople of that place for the brigade's assistance.

THE YORK COUNCIL—The County Council adjourned on Saturday night until Tuesday. Councillor Stephenson introduced a bill to appoint a solicitor, and the following gentlemen were nominated: J. K. Kerr, Q. C., W. D. Gregory, George H. Stephenson, Mr. Lawrence, of Lawrence & Milligan, and C. C. Robinson, Q. C. After considerable discussion Mr. C. C. Robinson was decided upon at \$600 per annum for his services. Mr. Rouden was appointed a director of the Lake Simcoe Junction railway. The council then entered upon the revision of the by laws.

THE FIRST OF THE SEASON—On Wednesday evening last the grounds of Mr. Jas. Kerswell were illuminated with a number of Chinese lanterns, it being the occasion of the annual garden party of St. John's Church, Oak Ridge. The band enlivened the entertainment with a number of fine selections. The tables as usual were filled with good things; ice-cream, oranges, candies, etc., were to be had for a trifle. Croquet, and swinging were indulged in by the young people. The tableau, the Irish Courship, was very good. The ladies and gentlemen deserve credit for it being such a marked success. The proceeds amounted to over \$60.

LAI D' REST—The remains of Mrs. Bernard Cosgrove, who was among the pioneer settlers of Markham, were laid away in the grave on Saturday at Thornhill. The good old lady had resided in Victoria Square, Markham, for forty-five years. She was one of the most estimable and respected of women. The funeral was attended by many people from the adjoining districts and from the city. A line of carriages, quite a mile in length, followed the body to the grave-side. The casket was carried by five sons, James, Francis, John J., Thomas and William, and a son-in-law of the deceased, J. Marshall. The funeral rites were said by Rev. Father Eggo, who referred very touchingly to the good qualities of heart which all who had known Mrs. Cosgrove had experienced. He said she would be missed by many friends and many who had known her kindness. She was the mother of Mr. J. J. Cosgrove of the inland revenue department of Toronto, and Mr. Francis Cosgrove of this village.

OUR BOYS AT GALT—On Friday last the hose and hook and ladder teams in connection with the brigade of this village accompanied by the band attended the Firemen's Tournament held in Galt, and were successful in winning second place in the hose race and had an accident not happened would probably have won the hook and ladder race. Although not fully sustaining the high reputation which they won for themselves at previous tournaments in Guolph, Toronto and Aurora, by securing first place on each occasion and thereby winning the championship of Ontario, they still do credit to themselves and are a source of pride to the residents of Richmond Hill. It must be remembered, in justice to them, that in competing in these races they meet teams from much larger towns and are thus placed on entirely different footing. A town with a population of several thousand have a great deal more material to choose from and must necessarily have a great advantage over a small village with a population of 800, therefore we claim that in winning second place under such adverse circumstances they are deserving of great praise. They reported favorably of the usage they received at the hands of the citizens of Galt and expressed themselves as being highly pleased with their day's outing and the Summer Carnival.

The Deadly Crossing.

In the Chancery Divisional Court at Osgoode Hall, a motion for an order for the examination of Stuart White, engine driver on the Grand Trunk railway, was made.

The facts of the case will be readily recalled. Henry Leach was killed sometime ago on the Pape avenue crossing by an engine of which White was in charge.

The engineer was charged with manslaughter, held for sometime, and finally discharged at a recent general sessions. In the meantime a suit for \$10,000 had been begun by the estate of Henry Leach and the motion was one of the stages in the case, which has been traversed several times from assize to assize.

The motion was made on the ground that the printed book of regulations for the guidance of the servants of the company had not as yet been put in evidence. One of the rules in the book was that a driver in charge of a light engine had all the powers of a conductor. In view of this representation the court allowed the motion, the costs to go with success in the suit.
