Black-Knot on Plums, by J. Hoyes Panton, M. A., F. G. S., professor of Natural History at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, is Bulletin LII, issued by the Ontario Department of Agriculture. After giving the life history of the fungus the professor proceeds to give the remedies for getting rid of it which are as fellows : -



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
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
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
