From the monthly weather review issued from the Meteorological office here the following facts are taken regarding the temperature at Poisento during May :--" The mean tem-perature was 58° 10°, or 6° 10° above the avreage. The highest temporature (91°) occurred on the 12th at 2:30 p. m., and the lowest $(28 \circ 8')$ at 3 a. m. on the first, giv-ing a montaly range of $62 \circ 2'$. The warmest day was the 12th mean temperature 75° 10', and the coldest the 3rd, mean temperature 39 ° 70°. On each of 24 days the mean temporature was above the average on that particular day, and below on 7 days."

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
