John Coulter, in a fit of Delirium Tremens, put an end to his existence by drowning, in the Messrs Wadsworth's mill pond, on the morning of the 8 h inst. Deceased has been a resident of this village during the past five years, and held the position of Section foreman on the G. T. R., but little of habits of deceased were known to the villagers outside of his immediate acquaintance. To them he was known as a great slave of alcohol his, drinking however mostly on the quiet and sione, little notice was taken as he continued to attend to his work. Lately it was remarked by his men that he was drinking heavier than hand, antil acous from days before his death, when he appeared quite sober. The day previous to his death he appeared quite cheerful, and at night assisted the man with whom he boarded to hoe potatoes until dark, when he went to bed. He appears to have only been a short time in bed, as he went to the house of another employer about half past ten, in a very excited state, and stayed until day light, when he left, as his friend supposed, to go to his boarding house. most reprehensible, being quiet close when he took the fatal plunge. Coulter, it appears, stood up in the water and bid them good by. The depth of water is variously stated as from 4 to 6 feet deep, but strange to say no effort seems to have been made to rescue 12 man which man, which might have been done with out the least risk, by holding each others hand. One could have walked round him withoutthe other leaving the shore. Deceased was 35 years of age. His body was followed to the grave by his aged mother and two brothers, whose grief was inconsolable. It is with regret we have to chronicle the sad and sudden death of Mr. Isaac Nattress, Deputy Reeve of Vaughan. On Tuesday of Last week, Mr. Nattress attended the meeting of the Council, in his usual health. The following morning while in the yard, some young horses came running up, and Mr. Nattress tryed to stop them, one ran over him and tramped on his chest. though medical aid was immediately summoned, the injury proved fatal, as he only lived forty eight hours after. He died on Friday morning and the remains were interred on Sunday. As an evidence of the esteem in which Mr. Nattress was held by the public, the funeral was the largest ever witnessed in the county by those present, about two hundred conveyances being counted in the procession. Mr. Nattross leaves a wife and a large family, most of whom are grown u. He will be missed not only in the immediate neighborhood where he resides, but by the Township and entire county. He has been elected three consecutive years to the position of second deputy Reeve of Vaughan, and whether as a public servant in the Township or County Council, or as a private individ-ual, he was a man faithful in the discharge of his duty.

THE COMETS.

Boston, June 25 .- Observations at the Harvard Observatory to-night with a spectroscope established the fact that the spectrum of the nucleus of the comet is continuous. It is estimated that the comet is moving away from the earth at the rate of 300,000 miles a day. The nucleus is probably a thousand miles in diameter, and at the inner head is is

twelve thousand, while the corona is vastly more. The tail is at least four million miles long.

ALEANY, N.Y., June 27.— From Dudley Observatory early this morning the comet presented a remarkable sight. The tail spread out into two well defined branches enveloping the north star. The eastward branch ran up, passing about 2½ degrees east of the north star, and shooting up towards the zenith fully torty degrees. The other branch shot up on the west for at leest thirty-five degrees. being about five degrees astronomically south-west of the Pole star. The diameter of the nucleus is decreasing. Professor Boss states positively that the comet is the same seen in South America on June 1st, by Gould.

HARTFORD, June 27. - Prof. Klein claims that he discovered the comet now attracting attention last September. He savs it is the comet of 1837.

ANOTHER COMET IN SIGHT. The following despatch from Chicago would indicate that another comet is

visible :--CHICAGO, June 27.—To night a new comet is visible here to the naked eye. It is about thirty degrees above the horizon in the north-west-by-north heavens. The tail is long, strongly defined, and perfectly straight, pointing in the direction of the zenith. There is no resemblance between this comet and the one visible between two and three a.m. The latter is shorter and more brilliant.
