**Venno.**

A decidedly cool to cold change on the 27th, 28th, and 29th, with showery weather and storms, chiefly in the west. This cold wave, he says, may carry frost in western sections, both in Canada and the United States.

**The Governor General.**  
On Thursday of last week, Lord Lorne and suite passed up the Northern by special train, on his way to visit Manitoba. They stopped twenty minutes at Newmarket, when he was welcomed by the Mayor and corporation. A complimentary address was presented to him, to which he made a brief reply. He called at several other important points along the line.

However if he is bound to put himself before the people, another lesson or two similar to the last two or three he got from the electors of Vaughan, will be of lasting benefit to him. Apart from election by acclamation, his nomination will be the most certain forecast of the success of his opponent, whoever he may be.

**Another Comet.**  
It is reported that a red, fiery looking comet is now visible in the sky. It became visible to the naked eye in Toronto on Sunday morning, with a tail one degree in length, is nightly becoming perceptibly brighter, and the tail is increased in length. It is situated at present between Beta and Theta in the constellation Auriga. Both comets are distinctly visible early in the morning, when the eastern sky is also rendered unusually brilliant by the presence of Jupiter are all visible with a small telescope. Venus is slightly gibbous, and in a telescope moderate power presents a very fine appearance, the light being most intense. The new comet has not been sufficiently observed by astronomers to enable them to make certain definite statements regarding its future appearance and course. By August 20th it will eclipse in brilliancy the comet which appeared in June, and is now growing indistinct.
