OUR MECHANICS INSTITUTE.

But now that church affairs are in good shape we hope to see the Institute get a proper share of public patronage, for want of which it has become somewhat crippled in its resources. It is the intention of the Management to make a strenuous effort during this winter to place it upon proper footing again, by holding Reunions, Concerts, Debates, an Art Exhibitions which will be held at Christmas, and if possible to establish a parliamentary debating club and a reading room, in which they hope to have the hearty cooperation of the public, failing to impart which they can be regarded as little less than criminally negligent.


Mr. Juo. Beasley, of the 9th has a new cidermill in operation. From the number of waggons containing barrels passing back and forth we expect he is doing a good business.

We believe the patrons of the C. M. church of Nobleton have decided to repair the building, and make it last for another Generation. The people here are not proud.


