



Parkdale on the 10th inst., for the purpose of choosing a standard-bearer for West York in the coming Dominion election, the unanimous choice fell upon Henry S. Howland of the city of Toronto. Though several other nominations were made, yet it was more to get speeches from the gentlemen than from any expectation that they would take the field as candidates. Among those nominated were Mr. H. S. Howland, Mr. Wm Mullock, of Toronto, Dr. Bull, Dr. McConnell, Mr. W. A. Wallis, Mr. John Winchester, Mr. J. S. Lockie. All the names were withdrawn except the two former, usither of whom were present. Upon a ballet being taken Mr. Howland received 151 votes, Mr. Mullock 49, a two-third vote being necessary to a choice, whereupon it was moved, and seconded by the mover and seconder of Mr. Mullock's nomination that the nomination of Mr. Howland be made unanimous, which was heartily carried without a dissenting voice. The meeting was one of the most enthusiastic and haymonions that has ever been held in the riding, and augurs well tor the result of the approaching contest. 
