Her Majesty the Queen has written to the Secretary of State for the Home Department stating how deeply her heart has been touched by the expressions of affection and sympathy from her subjects and the people of other nations in conwith the recent attempted assassination. She promises to continue unceasingly to the last hour of her life her endeavours to promote the welfare of her subjects, and in conclusion prays God to protect her for her people's sake as he has hith-erto so visibly protected her.

#### FOREIGN.

It is stated that there is strong indignation against the Czar among all circles of Russians.

A planet of the 13th magnitude has been discovered by Palisa at Berlin on the 10th of March.

The Panama canal has already cost over 1000 lives and \$25,000,000 and nothhas been accomplished.

Several Russian officers captured among the Bosinian insurgents, it is alleged, were shot without a court-martial by the Austrians.

The French Senate by a vote of 197 to 273 has rejected a proposition requiring schoolmasters to teach pupils their duty towards God and the country.

A terrible earthquake is reported to have recontly occured in Costa Rica, by which several towns were destroyed. Thousand, of lives are said to have been lost.

A good deal of uneasiness is exhibited by the French press, lest Gerna y should begin to fear a Russo-Franco alliance against her. The Russian Qlos strongly deprecates a war with Germany. Skobeleff delivered an address to a number of Russian officers, stating that the best Russian is the Czar. "Europe knows," he said " what his (Skobeleff's) views were on the Slav question. His recall was only a new humiliation, pro-ceeded from the man (Bismarck) who with blood and iron founded an empire which must be destroyed by Russian blood and iron.

at one of the Weston mills. The rest on reaching their destination sold for about 50 cents each. Log selling in those early days was scarcely a paying business, nevertheless it was by many considered preferable to burning the finiber. The Wadsworth's, of Weston, among others frequently purchased logs on the banks, they also on several occasions, floated plank and oth r heavy sawn jumber to Humber mouth, and thence rafted it to Hamilton where it was used in the con-struction of Dundren Castle. Consider able pine was also used in the making of charcoal.

OAK STAVES .- These were made three or five feet in length—gen r-lly five—s x inches broad, and two or three inches thick. About 1823 a Mr. Chisholm made a quantity of staves which were left in the bush not paid for. It was said he failed in business and died soon after. My father, among others, sold him timber. From 1826 John Paul (Maj.r), Peley Howland, Hector McLam and others, carried on stave making occasionally, for several years. In 1828 Mr. Lowis en-gaged extensively in the business, along the main Humber, Little Humber and West Branch. A few parties worked up their own oak and then sold the staves to Lewis. The staves were hauled on strong sleds to the river bank ; thence floated to the lake ; from thence carried in schooners to an island in the St. Laws ence, below Kingston. Finally they were rafted to Quebec, and shipped to the Old Country. I am get in **]** away from the Humber, but the digression seems necessary. In Vaughan, near the Scotch Block, there is a place which was called "Stave Bank," because of the quantity of staves placed there preparatory to being thrown into the r.ver. A bank on Lot 20, 6th Con of York, was similiarly named, and for the same "ea son. In 1839 Mr. Lewis got out a quartity of squared oak for the same destination which was also driven down the river. That was his last timber trans action in these parts.

GOVERNMENT WORKS. - About 1795 . mill was build by Government, at the hend of still water, about two miles and a half from the lake ; also a dock, where a yacht, for Governor Sincoe, and two schooners were built. The dock has long since disappeared About the same time an Indian trail was opened out into what has since been known as the Take shore road. There being no bridge across the Humber, waggons and foot passengers were conveyed over on a scow, for whic', convenience a charge was made. A frame house was erected near the cross ing, probably for the person having charge of the forry. Who was fire omproyed in that capacity I have new been able to ascertain, but about 1815 4 reotchman, named McLean had charge of the forry and occupied the house as a tavern. This is said to have been the only public house between Toronto and Hamilton at that time and for a consider able time a terwards. After the death of McLean his widow continued to des pense hospitality at the tavern for many
