ELECTION PROMISES.

The many promises made by the Tories before the last General Election do not appear to have been all realized. In fact, we might ask, have any of them been realized? The Roman Catholics of the Maritime Provinces are not by any means satisfied with the fulfilment of the promises, as Senator Power has given notice that he will ask the Government to explain why the promises made before the election of '78, that a Conservative Government would appoint the Roman Catholics of those Provinces to higher offices, and treat them more liberally generally than the Mackenzie Administration, have not been realized. This is but characteristic of the present Government, to "make themselves all things to all men, that they might win votes." They try to secure the Catholic votes by promises of more liberal treatment on the one hand, and they endeavor to secure the Orange vote by promising action on their much agitated question. But as it has been with the promises to the Roman Catholics of the Maritime Provinces, so it has been with all the promises made before the last election. There was not to be an increase in the tariff, but simply a "re-adjustment." The necessities of life were to be much cheaper and wages much higher, but wages were cut down after the imposition of protection, and it is only now when the cry is everywhere rising, "living is so much higher we must have an increase of wages," that they are coming back to the equilibrium. Tall chimneys were to be rising everywhere throughout the Dominion, but we fail to see them or the smoke they emit, save the smoke of the gas that is wasted in trying to make the people see what really does not exist. In Sir Leonard Tilley's list of new industries, we observe many which existed before the N. P. and many which have only simply removed from one place to another, given as new ones. Canada was to be for the Canadians, but now it is Canada for the Americans, if the course of the Government is to be our guide. Farmers were to have better prices for their produce, but they have had a lower average according to the ruling markets than they ever had under a revenue tariff; etc., etc., indefinitely.

It is altogether likely that by the time another general election comes round the Conservatives will have another set of promises manufactured by which they will endeavor to deceive the unwary, and catch the ear of the the public, but who ever saw a fox that got caught in a trap once, if he got free, get caught a second time?

The Princess Louise was 34 years old on Saturday and if it is not too late we would chime in "many happy returns".

Winnipeg is a beautifully cheap place to live and thrive. If you eat potatoes they only cost you \$2 per bushel. If you burn wood you only have to pay \$9 per cord. If you want to build a house you have only to pay your carpenter \$7 per day, and not get him then.

A new Temperance Order has been organized in St. Thomas to be known as the Royal Templars of Temperance. It is organized under auspicious circumstances having a number of prominent men connected with it and at its head Rev. A. M. Phillips, which alone is evidence that it means business.

"The Mutual Marriage Aid Association" is the name of a new company which has been organized in Hamilton. It is a sort of insurance company against marriage and any member of the society who is overtaken by this dire calamity receives from \$500 to \$50000, in some slight degree, make up for the unmitigated misery which the fates have inexorably decreed for him. From the nomenclature it would appear that this only applies to "Mutual Marriage."

Dr. Boyle, Reeve of Bowmanville, Vice-President of the Conservative Association of West Durham, who, says the Statesman, is noted for being the most uncompromising Tory and enthusiastic supporter of the National Policy in West Durham, in his report to the Council last Monday night remarks: "In view of the increased cost of living, etc., your Committee recommends that a small ad-

... of 10 per. cent. be allowed the labourers employed on the streets." It would be interesting to hear Dr. Boyle explain that the N. P. is not responsible for this "increase cost of living."

While the contest in the Reform ranks are being closed as candidates by the Reform electors, and the nominations are readily accepted, such a man as J. J. Hawkins is nominated in Botwell by the Conservatives, and in dispar the Tories of Lennox beg the interference of Sir John A. Macdonald to keep the country out of the control of the Reformers. Dr. Strange gives up North York, and Mr. McDougall is going to Manitoba, and abandons Hutton. Mr. McLennan will not run in Gengarry, Mr. Carling intends to desert London and take refuge in the Senate, Dr. O'Brien goes to the North-West, leaving Centre Wellington to the foe, and Mr. Drew ascends too Bench to escape the dangers of another election in North Wellington. Let Reformers push on their campaign now, make their nominations, and revise the electors' list, and if Sir Charles Tupper ventures to take the field and try his chances in June, Ontario will give him a lesson which will serve him for the remainder of his natural life. *Globe.*

The Council then adjourned to meet on Tuesday, April 11th at 10 o'clock, a. m.
