Obituary. On the 19th inst. at his residence, Mr. Wm. Pollock, one of the oldest residents of our village, after long period of illness, departed this life. Deceased was born in the Province of Nova Scotia, County of Hants, about the year 1804. He came to Richmond Hill in 1827 and taught school for a number of years, and then went into business in a general Dry Good and Grocery store. In 1828 he joined the Free Mason's in this village to which he belonged to the time of his death. The funeral took place from his residence on Tuesday afternoon, and was very largely attended. He was buried with Masonic honors. Rev. Mr. Dick preached a very appropriate sermon from 2 Thee. 4-14.
