COLONIZATION COMPANIES.

A few weeks ago we ventured the assertion that there would be at least two hundred and fifty North West Colonization Companies. Some of our good friends were inclined to characterize our assertion as extreme, absurd and altogether fanciful. But the facts already prove that we might safely have used a much larger number. There are already over three hundred such companies chartered and there is every probability that there will be yet a larger number of charters granted. In the vast amount of competition for settlers, and in consideration of the fact that these companies depend entirely for their success to the settlers, there is scarcely a possibility of all, or even a reasonable number of those Companies being able to carry out their obligations. What then? Why the whole company, settlers and all are at the tender mercies of the Government, and alas for their tender mercies, unless it be to vast monopolies, such as the Pacific Railway Syndicate.

CANADIAN.

R. J. Shepherd formerly of Brockville, committed suicide at Winnipeg by hanging.

A vote on the dry-dock question was taken in the British Columbia Legislature on Friday night last, when the Government was only saved from defeat by the casting vote of the Speaker. It is thought the Government will try and get through the Estimates and dissolve the House.

UNITED STATES.

St. Louis, April 1.—Two labourers while digging a drain yesterday unearthed a large pot containing English sovereigns, Queen American silver dollars and Continental currency. It is probably from 20,000 to 30,000 dollars of coin which is dated last century. The premises were formerly occupied by Montgomery Blair.

The indications are that President Arthur will veto the Anti-Chinese Bill.

Cornelius J. Vanderbilt, a son of the late Commodore Vanderbilt, committed suicide in New York yesterday.

A respite of two weeks has been granted to Dr. Lawson, in order that his friends in the United States may have an opportunity of bringing forward evidence.

The *St. James' Gazette* expresses the hope that Minister Lowell has not been instructed to "do anything so unusual and improper" as to ask for Dr. Lawson's reprieve, and trusts if such is the United States Government will receive the rebuff they so richly merit.

Jesse James, the notorious train robber, was shot and killed in the streets of St. Joseph, Mo. yesterday. The deed was committed by two of his old companions.

A large gathering took place in the Cooper Institute, New York on Monday night to protest against the detention of

United States citizens in British jails. Resolutions were passed demanding the recall of Lowell, and the prompt release of the imprisoned Americans. Among those present were "Yankee" Robinson S. S. Cox, O'Donovan Rossa, and Stephen J. Meany.

BRITISH.

A Committee has been formed in England to collect the £500 which Bradlaugh has been ordered by the Court of Queen's Bench to pay for voting illegal in the House of Commons.

The Hanlan-Bowl race on Monday, as was generally expected, resulted in an easy victory for the Canadian champion. An immense crowd witnessed the race, but the betting was not very spirited, the result of the contest being a foregone conclusion.

The Parnellites here resolved to call upon the Irish constituencies to record their opinion of the conduct of the Home Rulers voting for the cloture.

A disgraceful affair occurred recently in London Eng. A number of roughs assembled in a disused ritualistic chapel and held a prize fight within the altar rails, the altar itself being utilized as a seat for the referee.

Excitement has been caused in England by rumours of a Fenian conspiracy to set fire to London and other deeds of an equally violent and improbable character. The authorities have taken the precaution to largely increase night patrols. In Ireland the agitation has been fanned by a fiery proclamation which was posted throughout Dublin.

The East Cornwall election to the Imperial House of Commons has resulted in the return of Mr. Acland, Liberal, by a majority of 203.

FOREIGN.

The International Art Exhibition, at Vienna, was opened on Saturday.

Subhanoff, the Nihilist, who was executed at Cronstadt, was bound to a black post in a white shroud. Twelve minutes were fired at fifteen paces. Death was instantaneous.

The Powers will not agree to permit an exclusively Turkish occupation of Egypt, and in case of anarchy England and France will, it is predicted, actively intervene.

The Australian Premier, Sir Henry Parkes, is watching Sir A. T. Galt's movements in Paris with a view of securing the same trade relationship between France and his Colony as may be secured for the Dominion.

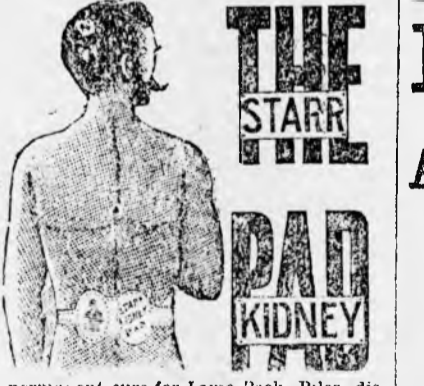
