For two years A clever and Apt Sature.—The Measure longer Mr. Brown occupied the place himself, using it as a maching shop and at the expiration of that time he was joined by Mr. Muir. In 1877 Mr. Muir retired from the business and in the following year the Wallace Bros. bought out the whole premises, turned the shop into a store house and built a flour mill

The flourishing village of Woodbridge was formerly called Burwick, after the late Mr. Rowland Burr, who may be said to have been its founder, He settled in the neighborhood in 1837, having exchanged a well-cleared and fertile 100 acre larm on Yonge street, for an un-cleared, rough tract on the Humber, owned by Mr. Washington Peck, a cooper by trade. A number of Iabouring men moved in with Mr. Burr, most of whom managed to secure building lots in the village, then only in embryo. Πı is said that these lots were measured by Mr. Burr, whose mode of measurement consisted in taking so many steps in one direction and so many in another, stakes being driven into the ground to mark the corners. This will probably explain the irregular shape of the village lots. It has been said that if everyone in the village had exactly what his deed covers, some of them would be taking possession of their neighbor's houses. Many of the old inhabitants of Woodbridge retain an affectionate and grateful rememberance of "Rowland Burr."

It seems to have been a practice almost invariably followed by those building mills or factories on the Humber to first erect a saw mill, with which to cut lumber for other buildings. This plan, how-ever, was departed from by Mr. Burr, who, in 1837, first erected a flour mill. In the following spring he built a saw mill and in the autumn a distillery and woollen factory. Of these buildings, the only one now remaining, as it originally stood, is the factory. It is only a small building, and in the early times did little but custom work. It is now deenpied by Mr. Abell as a shoddy factory. The distillery has been removed to a distance and converted into two dwelling houses. Two years subsequent to the date last mentioned, Mr. Burr built another and much larger woollen factory a little farther down the stream. This factory has been operated at different times by a number of firms. First, Hoit & Burr, then by Self & Burr, and later by Mitch-ell & McNally. After lying idle for some time the whole property fell into the hands of the late John W Gamble, when the factory was again put into operation by Mr. W. McNelly, then by Mr. Duncan McIntosh, and afterwards by the Roe
