MESSRS. MCKENZIE AND HODGINS.

Among the distinguished visitors who will favor our village with their presence on the Queen's Birthday will be Hon. Alexander Mackenzie and Mr. Thomas Hodgins, O. C. As their visit has a twofold object, viz: to attend the far-famed Richmond Hill Fair, and also to get acquainted with the electors who congregate in such numbers from both East and West York. We trust and doubt not, that the Reform friends in this vicinity will accord these worthy gentlemen a hearty welcome.

SIR JOHN'S MISTAKE IN COUNTING HIS CHICKENS.

The Gerrymandering Bill is a grand piece of statesmanship on the part of Sir John Macdonald and the Tory Government! So say the *York Herald*; so say all conscienceless and unprincipled Tory Journals; so say all the peerless Tory Leader's servile followers, though we are glad to see many of the more intelligent and conscientious of the Government supporters unhesitatingly pronounce upon the John-A-Mandering Bill as well as the disallowance of the Boundary Award in condemnatory terms. There is the fact, however, that in counting his chickens for the Redistribution Bill, Sir John has made a very serious mistake—one which will almost a surely prove fatal to his cherished plans on the day of the election. We find that the entire calculation has been based on the vote polled at the elections of 1878. It was forgotten that in 1878 above one-fourth, nearly one-third of the entire vote of the Province was unpolled. For instance, in West York there was 1500 unpolled votes in 1878. It is a well known fact that almost every Conservative vote, not only in West York, but in the Province was polled on that occasion, as well as securing a large number of Reform votes, who were gulled by the N.P. Then if we allow, for votes that would not in any case be polled and a margin for dissenting Conservatives one-third of the number, we have still about 1000 remaining, which we must assume to be almost exclusive Reform. In 1878, Mr. Wallace had a majority of 268, with the help of the many Reformers who voted for the N. P., but in 1882, with not only these Reformers returned to their first love, and their number increased by intelligent Conservatives who have openly avowed their intention of discountenancing the course pursued by the Government, both on the Boundary Award and the Gerrymandering Bill, where will Mr. Wallace's majority come from. We submit these few facts for that gentleman's supreme consolation.

But West York is only an instance of what will be the case throughout the Province. There is, at present, every prospect that Sir John's wonderful scheme by which he expects to retain power another term, will prove his own death-blow, not only because of its unparalleled monstrosity, but because of its being founded on a wrong basis. Reformers never had better prospects, and the course of the Government has only served to thoroughly arouse the latent energy of the great Liberal party in Canada, with whom right is might.

AN INTELLIGENT CONSERVATIVE'S VIEW OF TORY ADMINISTRATION.

The following letter, which appeared in the *Port Hope Times* a few days ago speaks for itself, and is but an instance of the course that will be pursued by many of the most intelligent Conservatives of the Country. From personal acquaintance with Mr. Powers, the editor of the *LIBERAL* knows him to be a man of unusual ability and sound judgment, and his influence will carry many other Conservatives with him where he is known.

Sir—Will you kindly allow me space enough to announce that I have resigned my position as President of the Hope Conservative Club? I placed my resignation in the hands of the secretary of the above club two months ago, and requested him to inform the Central Club of the fact. Whether he has done so or not, I am unable to say. I am still, however, a warm admirer of the much abused N. P. But not withstanding that fact, I cannot support the present Dominion Government in their unjust efforts to despoil Ontario of her equitable rights, nor aid orabet them in their injudicious measure to legis-

into themselves into power by gerrymandering Ontario. In short, I cannot conceive how any free people can tamely submit to such an outrage without, at least, entering a vigorous protest through the ballot box against such a monstrous deviation from political rectitude.

Mr. Wm. Mulock has received the nomination for the House of Commons in North York, Dr. Widdifield having withdrawn, as he did consider it wise, in view of future interests, to necessitate a by-election for the Local Legislature, which his acceptance of the candidature would have done. We congratulate North York upon the choice of so able and popular a man as Mr. Mulock, and have no hesitancy in stating that we believe he will be returned by a sweeping majority. Dr. Widdifield could easily have carried the riding, but the Dr. was considering future interests in his withdrawal.

The Orangeville *Gazette* mealy reiterates the statement that was made in the House that Mr. Blake read a telegram belonging to a member of the Government and made capital out of it, notwithstanding the fact that when the charge was made it was promptly and emphatically denied, and the party who made it was compelled to withdraw the statement on the floor of the House. But it shows to what a depth of meanness the Tory press will stoop to injure an opponent and serve party ends. The public knows too well the sterling honesty of the leader of the Opposition to be thus easily deceived by an unprincipled journal.

The *Mail* is very anxious that Sir Richard Cartwright should be sent to "South Australia, New Guinea or the North Pole." We are not surprised at the *Mail's* anxiety on this point, because, like Ninevah, the Tories have and will quail before the utterances of this powerful Jonah. But this is not the only anxiety of the Tories, as it is evident by the Gerrymandering Bill that they find their *bete noir* in several other members of the Reform party. In that bill the Tories have done their best to Legislate Messrs. Mills, Patterson, Charlton, Cameron, and other prominent Grits out of the House as well as Sir Richard.

Meaford Monitor (Independent):—But when one comes to consider the political effect of all these changes, the matter assumes a truly sinister and dangerous aspect. In nearly every instance in which the bounds of a constituency have been changed the change will either add to the strength of the Conservatives, lessen the strength of the Liberals, or render the majority in a strong Liberal constituency still greater while weakening the Liberals in the riding from which the town or township is taken away. If, then, the overwhelming internal evidence of the Bill itself establishes that the population of constituencies has not been equalized, and that one party is strengthened in almost every instance in which a change occurs, what man claiming to possess a particle of common sense can doubt that the Bill was concocted solely for party ends? * * * * We do not hesitate to express our opinion that the man who deliberately sustains such a measure as this is a betrayer of the best interest of this Province or Confederation, and we appeal to the honest electors of this and neighboring constituencies, Conservatives and Liberals, to show that they will not support any man who gives countenance to such a pernicious scheme.
