THE PROVINCE.
A vigorous and active Branch of the Alliance has been organized in every Province of the Dominion, and upon these devolve the real work of the Alliance. The duties of each Provincial are: To advocate the principles and promote the objects of the Alliance within the bounds of the Province, by endeavoring to procure the adoption and enforcement of Temperance Laws in different localities; encouraging the establishment of Temperance Hotels and Coffee Houses; watching Provincial legislation in reference to the liquor traffic, with a view to render it as efficient as possible; and assisting in all practical efforts to restrict the traffic.

The Ontario Branch, which was organized in 1879, is now steadily at work. During the year 1881 Professor Foster prepared and published a series of 6 four-page leaflets, 6 eight-page pamphlets, edited and prepared for publication 9 issues of a special campaign paper, prepared and published an edition of 2,000 copies of the *Canada Temperance Manual*, addressed eight annual gatherings of representative bodies, organized 15 auxiliary alliances, and delivered 160 public addresses.

The Dominion Alliance for the Total Legal Suppression of the Liquor Traffic in Canada, was organized in February, 1876, with a view to combine the Temperance forces of the country in a systematic and persevering attack upon the legal strongholds of the traffic. It is in no sense a rival of the existing temperance organizations, but rather serves as a centre of union around which all temperance men may rally in a determined effort for complete and total Prohibition. It prescribes no test of membership other than agreement with its aims, and co-operation in its work. The following is its **DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES**:

I. That it is neither right nor politic for the State to afford legal protection and sanction to any traffic or system that tends to increase crime, to waste the national resources, to corrupt the social habits and to destroy the health and lives of its people.
II. That the traffic in intoxicating liquors, as common beverages, is inimical to the true interests of individuals and destructive of the order and welfare of society, and ought therefore to be prohibited.
III. That the history and results of all past legislation in regard to the Liquor Traffic abundantly prove that it is impossible satisfactorily to limit or regulate a system so essentially mischievous in its tendencies.
IV. That no consideration of private gain or public revenue can justify the upholding of a system so utterly wrong in principle, suicidal in policy, and disastrous in results, as the traffic in intoxicating liquors.
V. That the Legislative Prohibition of the Liquor Traffic is perfectly compatible with national liberty, and with the claims of justice and legitimate commerce.
VI. That rising above sectarian and party considerations, all good citizens should combine to procure an enactment prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages, as affording most efficient aid in removing the appalling evil of intemperance.

DOMINION ALLIANCE.

Organization—Principles and Aims of the Ontario Branch.

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The Organization as a whole comprises a Branch Alliance for each Province, and a Dominion Council made up of representatives from the Provincial Branches.

THE DOMINION COUNCIL
is composed of its own officers, the President, Secretaries, and Treasurers of the Provincial Branches, and Delegates chosen by each Provincial Branch in the following proportions:—Ontario, 30; Quebec, 30; Nova Scotia, 15; New Brunswick, 15; Prince Edward, 5; Manitoba, 3; British Columbia, 2.

The Council meets annually at Ottawa for the transaction of necessary business—employs no paid agents, has no fees—collects no monies—and provides for its small printing expenses, by an assessment on the Branches. The duties of the Council are:

1. To endeavor to secure legislation by the Dominion Parliament in harmony with the principles and aims of the Alliance.
2. To take steps for the organization of Provincial Branches where none exist.
3. To carry on Alliance work in any Province where there is no Provincial Branch.
4. To secure and direct the co-operation of the various Provinces in general and inter-provincial work.

Thus the Council becomes a bond of union between the several Provincial Branches—a rallying centre for Prohibitionists throughout the Dominion—a medium for united action in reference to Dominion legislation regarding the liquor traffic.

THE PROVINCIAL BRANCHES.
A vigorous and active Branch of the Alliance has been organized in every Province of the Dominion, and upon these devolve the real work of the Alliance. The duties of each Provincial are: To advocate the principles and promote the objects of the Alliance within the bounds of the Province, by endeavoring to procure the adoption and enforcement of Temperance Laws in different localities; encouraging the establishment of Temperance Hotels and Coffee Houses; watching Provincial legislation in reference to the liquor traffic, with a view to render it as efficient as possible; and assisting in all practical efforts to restrict the traffic.

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During the past few months the Secretary, W. G. Fee, has been actively engaged in organizing in each county and city in the Province, an auxiliary branch of the Ontario Alliance. Such an auxiliary will form for the county or city, a Temperance Council, ready and powerful to bring united influence to bear upon public sentiment, to the end that existing liquor laws may be obeyed, the Canada Temperance Act preserved and strengthened, and the people and Legislature be prepared for the speedy enactment of a complete prohibitory law.

DUTIES OF AUXILIARY ALLIANCES.
1. Each Auxiliary Alliance shall schedule the county or city into speaking places, and arrange by means of local talent and the Lecturers of the Ontario Alliance, to hold a Temperance and Prohibition Mass Meeting in each of these centres at least once every three months.
2. Collect yearly statistics of the liquor traffic and its consequences, in its own jurisdiction, under such heads as follows:

(a) No. of Hotel Bars.
(b) No. of Shop Licenses.
(c) The criminal statistics of the county or city, arranged under its headings of "Crime and Disorder."
(d) The expense of criminal justice, support of poor, and details of any prominent case arising out of liquor.

3. See that existing liquor laws are enforced; and raise a yearly fund to be devoted to the purchase and distribution of literature, the expenses of lectures, &c.
The Ontario Alliance aims at doing good and efficient work. It proposes to work for the adoption of the Suet Act in all counties where feasible; to endeavor to gain amendments to the "Crooks' Act," separating the sale of Liquors from other articles, prohibiting by Provincial Statute the sale of liquors to minors, refusing license to any but bona fide hotels, and restricting the number of them to one for every eight hundred or one thousand inhabitants; and to prevail on the Government of Ontario to introduce Scientific Temperance Text Books into the Schools.

Friends and co-workers,—will you cooperate with the Ontario Alliance in the furtherance of its aims and objects as outlined above? If you have confidence in our work and plans, do us help with your co-operation and sympathy in a determined crusade against that legalized enormity of our country—the Drink Traffic.
