## **Election Notes.**

The Election takes place on the 27th inst., the Nominations on the 20th.

Proolamations have been issued by the Returning Officers of the various Ridings, calling meetings of the electors for the nomination of Candi lates, on the 20th inst. J. M. Lawrence, Esq., Returning Officer for West York, has called the momination at the Russell House, Weston.

The time is short. Two weeks from Tuesday will tell the tale. Short though it may be, there is enough time however to do the work that is necessary to be done in order to ensure a glorious victory for Provincial Rights, Honest Government and the principles of Temperance, and to give to the party that is willing to lay the Province of Ontario a sacrafice at the feet of Sir John Macdonald and the Quebec Bleus, and who is trampling on Provincial Rights and who is playing into the hands of the liquor interests of the country, such a crushing defeat that they will at once and forever understand that Ontario means to defend her own rights, and allow neither usurper nor traitor to ternish the fair fame of the Queen Province of the federation.

But this is not to be accomplished without any effort on the part of those who desire to see the right sustainedand the wrong crushed out. Let "Excelsior" be written on the banner of every Reformer, and if borne for ward with the spirit of Longfellow's hero, and with work, work, work as his motto the goal will be victory ; indifference will be sure and ruinous defeat.

There is not a doubt but there will be a vory large Conservative vote po.led on the day of election. The object of the Conservative lights is to get the same votes they did at the Dominion election. Of course the issues are entirely different, but they will endeavor to blinufold the eyes of many, and no doubt they will succeed to a large extent, but Reformers must not be idle or the enemy will steal a march.

An independent Journal sounds the key note well when it says : " Don't make any mistake. The Conservatives, if Sir Johu can make them, are going into the fight as · Conservatives, not as provincial-righters or provincial-wrongers." Truly provincial rights or provincial wrongs receive no consideration at their hands if they can but carry the elections.

## YORK COUNTY COUNCIL. FRIDAY'S SESSION.

The Council resumed Friday morning -the Warden in the chair.

After roll call the Conneil went into Committee of the whole, with Mr. Secor in the chair, on the report of the County Commissioners for 1883.

The Commissioners recommended that the Commissioners of the present year be instructed to re-let gate No. 1 on the Kingston road, for the unexpired portion of the term of letting, on the usual terms, subject also to the right of the county to reassume the gate in the event of the boundaries of the city of Toronto being extended so as to intrefere therewith. The clause was adopted.

The Council resolved its self into a committee of the whole, with Mr. Ashton in the chair, on the by-law for the appointment of a board of Audit for 1883. Messrs. John Crawford and Eratus Jackson were re-appointed to the position in conjunction with the junior judge of the county.

Mr. Frank Turner moved, seconded by Mr. H. R. Frankland, that all toil gates on the county roads be forthwith removed. In moving the resolution he said he found that the expenses for 1882, on these roads were \$10,800, \$14,986, on which was for macadam and labor, and \$1,813.55, for sundries, and he found from the engineer that \$27,300 had been received from the toll-gates. There were tifteen toll-gates, each of which supported a tamily It appeared to hun that the lowest amount of money that would support these families would be about \$500 each, making a total of \$7,500, for the fifteen toll-gates. They were paying \$7,500 for the purpose of simply collecting \$27,300, and it appeared to him that it was altogether too great a percentage. The assessed value of the county was apout \$30,000,000, and supposing they abolished the toil-gates the money required to maintain the roads would be something less than one third of a mill in the dollar on the whole taxation of the county. It as a very small figure, and the time had come when the tollgates should be removed not only from an economical point of view, but they were certainly a bar to progress. As Yorkvile was de jacto a part of the city of Toronto, the city would buy that part of the road which runs through that village. Riverside, Park dale, and Brockton would also come mto the city of Toronto, and the city would buy all these pieces of the county roads, The toll-gates should be abolished as soon as arrangements could be made with lossees to take the gates off their hands at a reasonable figure. After some discussion on the subject, the motion was put, and lost. The Council then acjourned till Tues-

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
