WIGGINS' STORM.

He Claims a Great Success.

His Theory Explained.

Professor Wiggins claims a great success for his predictions of a great storm from March the 9th to the 11th. True it is that in many parts of Ontario and in fact America there were heavy winds, and along the Atlantic seaboard the tides rose higher than they have been known for many years. In Newfoundland the storm was fierce and some damage was done. Little or no damage occurred to shipping, as the prophet predicted. In many parts of Canada there were heavy winds, accompanied by considerable snow, which blocked the roads and railways in many places, but this is nothing extraordinary, but only what we expect in the month of March. The following is Wiggins' theory of foretelling these storms: "This storm satisfies me that the theory of an opposite tide, which I advanced in 1864, is correct, namely that it is caused by the vibratory motion of the ocean from east to west. If you will look at the terrestrial globe and see the peculiar position of the Gulf of Mexico and the tendency of Cape of St. Roque to glance northward, the tides moving west, you will not wonder at my alarm when observing the moon's forces have been increased to the greatest possible extent, and that, too, when she is hastening with other planets from south to north across the equator. This was exactly the condition of things during this storm, and only one element was lacking to have made this a terrible affair for the people of America. For, mark it well if the moon's conjunction with the sun had taken place at one o'clock on the meridian of London, instead of four o'clock in the morning, London time; in other words, if the conjunction had taken place over the Gulf of Guinea, instead of China sea, the whole American coast, grazing her to have been as she was in perigee, would have been under water. And the time will come when this will take place, and should Venus and Mercury happen at that moment to be at their inferior conjunction, and Jupiter, and Mars and Saturn at their superior conjunction, breakers will roar in the streets of New York city, and Florida will be under water."

New Court-House Committee.

The joint committee of the City Council and County Council of York met at the County Clerk's office Thursday afternoon to discuss a scheme for the erection of a new court-house. The Mayor and Ald. Walker represented the city, and Messrs. Jackson (warden), Duncan, Porter, Watson, Rowan and Richardson represented the county of York.

The County Councilmen on their part submitted the following scheme:

1. That a new court-house should be erected on a new site, to be selected and purchased on joint account.
 2. That the location of such site be settled by mutual consent or by reference.
 3. That the proportion of the cost to be paid by the County Council and the City Council respectively be readjusted by mutual consent or by reference, as nearly as may be, on the basis of the proportion as to maintenance, now acted upon by both municipalities.
 4. That the maintenance and annual charges and rents hereafter be enquired into every five years, and the proportion chargeable to each municipality be arranged or adjusted by consent or by reference.
 5. That the City and County Treasurers be requested to ascertain figures and details, and express an opinion as to the proportion to be paid by each Council towards the erection of the new building.
 6. That the County Council retain the control of the building as at present, subject to conditions to be settled upon by consent or reference.
- A free and easy discussion ensued upon the essential points of the above proposition, after which it was decided to allow the City Committee to formulate a scheme of its own for submission to the County Council for further consideration. The meeting then adjourned.
