THE DISPUTED TERRITORY.

The Ontario Government Seizing a Million's Worth of Timber.

The Prince Arthur's Landing Herald of April 25 says that during the past winter the Section B company cut out over a million dollars' worth of lumber in the disputed territory, for railway building purposes. They took out over 1,750,000 ties alone. But the Company got no license from or paid the Ontario government any money, and the latter have instructed their inspector of the lumber at the landing, Wm. Margach, to seize all the ties and lumber in the question. Mr. Margach took the train as far as Savanne, from which place he will take to the woods and seize everything that has been cut, posting up notices that anyone touching the materials will be arrested and dealt with as a person would be for stealing. His instructions are very emphatic, and he says that he intends carrying them out to the letter.

THE HUGE MONOPOLY.

How they grind the Unfortunate Settler.—Hard Times of a Port Hope Boy.

A few weeks ago Mr. Fred. Gilchrist and Capt. Robins' son left Port Hope in company for the North-West, intending to settle in the Qu'Appelle country. Fred. took with him a yoke of oxen and a lot of other goods, which he shipped as far as Brandon—he could not get rates any further. From Brandon to Qu'Appelle station, ninety miles, the Canada Pacific R. R. Co. charged him as much as it had cost him from Port Hope to Brandon, which cleaned Fred. nearly out of cash. Then to add to his trouble, his oxen strayed away and got into an "overflow" or slough, and in trying to get them out he would most assuredly have lost his life had it not been for the heroic efforts of young Robins, but the cattle were both drowned, and poor Fred. is now left without money or team. He has located a quarter section, but is now entirely helpless. Some of his friends in Port Hope are interesting themselves in raising money to get him another yoke of oxen. We hope they may be successful.

Deserted Wife.

Mrs. Clarke, of Fairbank, in the township of York, sued her husband for alimony on the ground of desertion and ill-treatment. She was married in January, 1879, her husband being then a widower with two children, and she stated the reason for his desertion of her was that his daughter, a girl of nine years, called her a "liar," whereupon she boxed the child's ears and was in return boxed by her husband. This quarrel and other acts of violence caused the desertion. On the other hand the husband claims that he is weak and delicate, and was abused and ill-treated by his wife, who was very violent; charges of food adulteration are also made. An order was made in chambers for payment of \$15 a month to the wife as interim alimony.

Richmond Hill Council.

The Village Fathers met in the Council Chambers on Monday evening, the 7th inst. The Reeve in the chair. Members present, Councillors Sanderson, Pugsley, and Hopper. Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted.

The following communications were read by the Clerk:

By-Law No. 400, of the County Council, for regulating the driving and riding of horses and other cattle on highways, bridges, etc.

Mr. Pugsley, seconded by Mr. Hopper, moved that the Treasurer be authorized to draw the amount of Mr. Morrison's Bill from the funds in the Bank of Commerce and pay the account.—Carried.

The Clerk reported that the Assessor had returned the Assessment Roll.

Saturday, June 2nd, at 2 p. m., was appointed for holding Court of Revision.

Mr. Pugsley, seconded by Mr. Hopper, moved that the Clerk be instructed to advertise Court of Revision in both local newspapers.—Carried

At the request of Dr. Wilson, Mr. Sanderson brought the matter of tree planting before the Council, and requested the Reeve to appoint a day to be set apart for tree planting. The matter was discussed.

Mr. Pugsley, seconded by Mr. Sanderson, moved that the Reeve be instructed

to issue printed invitations to the public to turn out for tree planting for the decoration of our village on Friday, May 12th, '83.—Carried.

The matter of the sanitary condition of the northern part of the village was brought before the Council by Mr. Sanderson relative to the ditch on the west side of Yonge St. It was intimated that the ratepayers were willing to have a frontage tax imposed in order to have the ditch boxed and filled. It was thought that as there was no petition by the ratepayers the Council could not take action in the matter it would be better if the property owners would agree among themselves, some of them having already expressed their willingness, to join together and do it, or otherwise get up a petition to be presented to the Council. The Council adjourned until Monday June 4th, '83.
