County and City.

The Court House Committee of the City Council met at half past eleven on Friday in the City Hall to consider the matters in dispute between the city corporation and county re the annexation of Yorkville. There were present Alds. Walker, (Chairman) Saunders, Irwin, Turner, and Love, and County Warden Jackson. Mr. Jackson stated that the County Council was will-ing to allow the city to have possession of that portion of Yonge street which it assumed when it annexed Yorkville, without further dispute. This proposition, however, did not meet with the approval of the committee. After considerable discussion the committee resolved to recommend to the City Council that all matters in dispute between the city and county of York, in connection with the annexation of Yorkville, be referred to arbitration, and that Mr. J. E. Smith be arbitrator for the city. The committee then adjourned, the subject of the pro-posed new Court House building not being touched upon.
