On Monday morning a double wedding took place in the village of Thornhill. Early in the morning two couples, each arm in arm, and one on each side of the street, were seen marching at a hurried pace toward the residence of the parish priest. The knot was duly tied and the parties returned to Richmond Hill rejoicing, whence they afterwards walked to Maple on their wedding trip. There was not much excitement outside the village, and only those who were not accustomed to seeing matrimony in the emerald suffered from the shock to their various systems. The event, however, caused quite a flutter in society.

School Changes.

At a meeting of the Board of Education on Thursday last, several important changes were inaugurated. Mr. McBride, Head Master of the High School, had his salary raised from \$1100 to \$1200, but out of which he pays for caretaking and Local Examinations for Women. Mr. Burns, First Assistant, was raised to \$700. Mrs. Kirkham, of Elora, was engaged as Second Assistant in High School at a salary of \$450. Miss Sprague, of Owen Sound, was engaged as principal of the Public School at a salary of \$400. Miss Williams and Mrs. Wiley were re-engaged as First and Second Assistants, respectively, and the Third Assistantship, (a new addition to the staff) was offered to Miss T. Rutherford, at a salary of \$225.

Jubilee Singers.

On Thursday evening of last week the Richmond Hill public was treated to a concert by the Hawkins' Company of Jubilee Singers. The company though well known here has undergone several changes since its last appearance in Richmond Hill, and it has suffered none by the changes. Rev. Mr. Miller, the musical manager, ably fills the place of Elder Hawkins; Miss Hawkins and Miss Hackett are still prominent among the musicians; Mr. J. H. Davis, the noted bass and business manager, is still an interesting feature of the company. The later additions are Misses Lightfoot, Turner and Woodgate, Pianist. Altogether the concert was a rare treat. The solo of Miss Lightfoot, the duett of Misses Hackett and Turner, and the rendering of "Steal away to Jesus," by the company are worthy of special mention. We congratulate the people of Yonge Street North, under whose auspices it was held, on the success of the week's engagement, which netted them nearly \$100.

School Board.

The School Board met on Thursday 1st inst. President in the chair. Members present Messrs. Lane, Trench, Teffy, Patterson, Crosby, Boyle, Brown, Switzer, Savage, Duncan and Rev. I. Campbell. Minutes of previous meeting read.
 Moved by Mr. Teffy, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that the names of yeas be entered in last minutes.—Carried.
 Moved by Mr. Campbell, seconded by Mr. Savage, that the Secretary answer the communication from Miss Hamilton concerning balance of salary due her and state that it will be paid as soon as possible.—Carried.
 The report of the committee who visited the schools was read.
 Moved by Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that Miss Williams and Mrs. Wiley be re-engaged at their present salaries, \$250 each.—Carried.
 Moved by Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Crosby, that we engage a fourth teacher for the Public School.—Carried.
 Moved by Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Brown, that the fourth department of the Public School be offered to Miss Rutherford, at a salary of \$225.—Carried.
 Moved by Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that Mr. Burns be re-engaged as 1st Assistant in High School at a salary of \$700.—Carried.
 Moved by Mr. Switzer, seconded by Mr. Trench, that the application of Mr. Bassingthwaite be accepted for Principal of Public School.
 Moved in amendment by Mr. Teffy, seconded by Mr. Duncan, that the application of Miss Sprague be accepted, at a salary of \$400.
 The original motion was lost and the amendment declared carried.
 Moved by Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Crosby, that Mr. McBride be re-appointed as Head Master of the High School at a salary of \$1200 per annum, to include the caretaking of the building, and expenses of Local Exams, for Women.—Carried.
 Moved by Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Brown, that Mrs. Kirkham be engaged as 2nd Assistant in High School, at a salary of \$450 per annum.—Carried.
 Moved by Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Brown, that Messrs. Crosby and Duncan be a committee to make arrangements with Mr. Coulter for land in rear of Masonic Hall for the use of the High School, and outbuildings, &c., and to secure wood for the High School.—Carried.
 Moved by Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Boyle, that the back hall be rented to the A. O. U. W. at 75 cents per night.—Carried.
 Moved by Mr. Crosby, seconded by Mr. Trench, that the Head Master be allowed to rent the Masonic Hall to the Presbyterian Church, to hold a concert on Thanksgiving Day, rent to be applied to the Library of Reference.—Carried.
 The Board then adjourned.
