The members-elect having executed the declaration of qualification and of office took their seats and proceeded to business.

A petition was presented from Robert Gordon and six others, asking to be removed from Union S. S. No. 1, Vaughan and Markham, to S. S. No. 5, York.

Moved by Mr. Reaman, seconded by Mr. Cook, that Mr. Henry Franks be appointed caretaker of the Town Hall for the year 1884, and that he be paid the sum of \$16 by the Treasurer for the same.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Malloy, seconded by Mr. Elliott, that the account of the Toronto General Hospital, amounting to \$90 40, being 82 days for J. Hannah and 144 days for Mr. Kenney, be paid. Fitcher for Hall, 25 cents.—Carried.
