SCHOOL BOARD MEETING.

The second meeting of the above Board for the present year met in the Council Chamber on Wednesday afternoon. The minutes of last meeting were read and sustained.

Trustees present, Messrs. Marsh, Switzer, Crosby, Boyle, Trench, Brown, Patterson, Skeele and McConaghy.

Mr. Brown, as a member of the County Council, stated that Wm. Trench and M. Naughton had been appointed High School Trustees by that body.

A communication was received from Mr. I. Crosby, resigning his position as Treasurer of School Board.

Moved by Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Crosby, that Mr. J. A. E. Switzer be re-elected Secretary.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Switzer, seconded by Mr. McConaghy, that Mr. D. Boyle be elected Treasurer.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Boyle, seconded by Mr. Skeele, that W. Trench be Treasurer.

The original motion was afterwards carried and Mr. Boyle was declared Treasurer.

Moved by Mr. Boyle, seconded by Mr. Patterson, that Messrs. Brown, Trench and Crosby act as a committee of management.—Carried.

The following accounts were ordered to be paid:—Mr. J. Brown, for shingles, \$1 25; John J. Cook, for wood, \$105; W. Trench, for seats, &c., \$8 75.

A communication was received from Miss Crickshank of the 4th Department, asking for an increase of salary.

Moved by Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Trench, that the communication be laid over for six months.—Carried.

A communication was read from Mr. Burns, First High School Assistant, asking that his son's fees to High School be refunded.

Moved by Mr. Crosby, seconded by Mr. Brown, that it be laid over for further consideration.—Carried.

At this stage the new members-elect asked some important information respecting the management of the school which brought about a lively discussion.

A communication was received from Mr. Wm. McBride, late Head Master of High School 1, asking for a testimonial also in reference to Mr. E. F. Langstaff's salary as Assistant Teacher.

Moved by Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Boyle, that the Chairman and Mr. Crosby be a committee to draft a testimonial for Mr. McBride.—Carried.

Communication in reference to E. F. Langstaff laid over.

In answer to a communication from Mr. Burns, it was moved by Mr. Crosby, seconded by Mr. McConaghy, that he be paid his salary weekly.—Carried.

The meeting then adjourned to meet at the call of the chair.

VILLAGE COUNCIL.

Pursuant to adjournment, the Council met, the Reeve in the chair. Councillors present: Messrs. Hopper, Law, and Moodie. Mr. I. Crosby made and subscribed the declarations of qualification and of office, as councillor, and took his seat.

From Pratt & Tracy of Stratford, relating to "The Municipal Councillors' Manual."

Moved by Mr. Crosby, seconded by Mr. Law, that the Clerk be and is hereby authorized to procure one copy of the "Manual."—Carried.

Following accounts were read: Frank Cook for shovelling snow, \$1.50. A. J. Rupert, coal & freight acct. 950.

Mr. Moodie moved, seconded by Mr. Crosby, that the Treasurer pay the above accounts.—Carried.

Mr. Crosby, seconded by Mr. Hopper, moved that the Fire and Water Committee be hereby authorized and instructed to enter into an agreement with a suitable person, to take care of the Fire Engine, Apparatus and fire hall.—Carried.

The Council adjourned to meet on Monday March 3rd, at 8 p. m.
