On Monday the Ladies' Aid gave a grand tea, after which addresses were delivered by Revs. Totten, Leek and Starr. On account of the absence of Mr. Thomas Williamson, ex-Reeve, Mr. S. M. Brown, of Victoria Square, was elected chairman. Mr. Carson, of Toronto, presented to the people of Headford one of his highly amusing, instructive and scientific lectures on ventriloquism, also oval illustrations of such. We have no doubt but that Mr. Carson, should he return, would be the recipient of a warm reception. The honored chairman very kindly and charitably made use of his profession by selling the quilt belonging to the Ladies' Aid, upon which over 700 names had been written, containing subscriptions from 10 cents up to \$1.00. TORONTO TOPICS.

The Legislative Assembly is still sitting and are likely to be for some time, as but little work has been done yet. The debate on the speech from the throne was not closed until the latter part of last week. Mowat has a fair working majority and at times reminds his friends opposite of the fact. It appears strange that while one member is speaking others are reading the papers, writing, and perhaps others at times taking a nap; and many of the members on both sides keep their hats on all the time. Others again are watching the speaker and dotting down notes continually in order to render his speech absurd if possible.

The city just now is pestered with robbers, burglars and thieves. Not a day passes but some person laments the loss of money or property through dishonesty. Notwithstanding the vigilance of the "peelers," such occurrences are on the increase.

Normal School opened last week. There were 121 students present. Addresses to the students were given by Drs. Davies, Carlyle and the Minister of Education. Dr. Davies intends leaving the city, on the 13th inst., for a couple of weeks' tour through parts of the U. S.

There was another big fire on Tuesday night, Morse's Soap Factory, at east end of Toronto St., was burned, together with four G. T. R. freight cars. Davies' Packing Factory sustained a loss of about \$2,500. The loss on the soap factory is about \$50,000.
