TORONTO TOPICS.

I wish to send you a few items from Toronto, but there are so many items that if a person were to take all I fear you would find room for nothing else. To begin, I suppose I should give the most important first, and doubtless the result of the voting on the Licensed Grocers' Bill, on Monday, holds foremost place this week. A great amount of canvassing was done on both sides. The Licensed Grocers worked hard; and why shouldn't they? For should the Bill pass they would be prohibited selling liquor on any condition. They appeared confident of success, but their hopes proved vain, for the returns declared in favor of temperance, by a majority of between 300 and 400.
Monday forenoon there was big talk of a dynamite explosion at some bank, but it proved to be, not a dynamite, but a gas explosion in the Bank of Commerce. The gas in the vault had not been turned off, and when a clerk entered it with a light, the first thing he knew he knew nothing, and his fellow clerks knew the same thing. One man was sent through a window and sat down in the street rather suddenly. The building was damaged to the extent of \$700.

The greatest event of the season in theatrical circles was the appearance of Henry Irving and Ellen Terry, at the Grand last week. They were here for three days, beginning on Thursday. On Friday they played the "Merchant of Venice," before an immense audience. The audience were full of anticipation, and expected acting the like of which had never been seen in Toronto before, nor were they disappointed. The acting of all parties was excellent, but reached the height of perfection in Irving's renderings of "Shylock," and Ellen Terry's of "Portia."
A very interesting debate was held in Knox College Convocation Hall, one evening last week. Subject: "Resolved that itinerancy should be adopted by the Presbyterian Church." Rev. Dr. Reid filled the chair and when giving decision admitted that he could scarcely view the subject without bias. The negative won the day, or rather night. I noticed among the singers in the Glee Club Mr. Thomas Scott, formerly of Aurora.
